The minutes of the previous meeting having been in the hands of the members, were approved without reading.

Mr. Graham presented a proposition from Mr. C. J. Monroe in regard to the Purchase of lands belonging to the State Board of Agriculture at South Haven Experiment Station and the sale of certain other lands in that vicinity to the State Board of Agriculture for Experiment Station purposes. Upon this proposal, Mr. Graham to whom the matter was referred, made an adverse report which, on motion of Mr. Doherty, was accepted.

Mr. Graham also presented a communication from E. B. Muller & Co., of Port Huron, Michigan, in regard to the importation of chicory seed from Germany, in which the State Board of Agriculture was requested to make application to the Foreign Trade Advisor for permission to make such importation.

President Kedzie presented the following letter from Prof. Patten, Chemist of the Experiment Station, in regard to the administration of the feeding stuffs law. April 19, 1916. Pres. F. S. KedZie, College. Dear Sir:-Patten's I wish to explain a situation that has arisen in connection with the letterin administration of the Feeding Stuffs Law. regard to Teeding We have taken the position that the mixing of screenings with wheat bran Stuffs Law.or middlings constitutes a mixed feed within the meaning of the law and if such mixtures are sold in the State they should be licensed.

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Before definitely taking this position we examined a large number of samples of bran and found the amount of foreign material to vary from 0.08 to 18.83% consisting of shrunken wheat, weed seeds, oat hulls, chaff etc. In some cases we found ten or more different kinds of weed seeds.

I also submitted the question to the Attorney General and have his opinion supporting our ruling.

The Michigan millers are objecting to this ruling and apparently are getting ready to fight the matter through the courts.

I believe this is one of the most important matters that will arise in connection with this work and I feel that it would be advisable for the State Board of Agriculture to be advised of the situation.

Dear President Kedzie:-

Several days ago, at your suggestion, two Lansing business men conferred Communicawith Mr. Hudson and myself relative to the possibility of procuring ninety-six acres tion from of the College farm, directly across the road from the farm buildings on the Wood- Dean Shaw. bury estate, to be used for the establishment of a "Country Club". We both expressed the opinion that it would be a mistake for the College to offer this area for sale, thereby reducing the total area all of which will be required to meet the future needs. We did, however, express ourselves favorably relative to an exchange of the front part of the Hicks property for the College land, as it is difficult to keep the latter fenced on account of the annual floods of the Cedar river.

At the second conference yesterday the Lansing representatives expressed their desire to use both the College ninety-six acre area and fully two-thirds of the front Hicks eighty. Their basis of exchange consisted in offering the back Hicks eighty and about twenty-five acres of low Lad of the front eighty for the College property. As nearly all the land offered in exchange is below the high water line, consists of cold wet quick sand bottom and would be practically worthless except for pasturage, both Mr. Hudson and myself are strongly opposed to the slightest consideration of such a proposition. The only form of exchange which we favor would include the front Hicks eighty, buildings and all, for the College ninety-six acre tract and even then we are not prepared to recommend an even trade, as the Hicks farm soil is not as good as that of the College property.
