Present, President Snyder, Judge Carpenter, and Messrs. Granam, Waterbury. Operdorffer. Donerty and Wallace.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Marti app'td. On motion of Judge Carpenter, Mr. W. C. Marti was appointed Assistant Chemist of the experiment Station, at a salary of \$1000.00 per annum.

> On motion of Mr. Donerty, Mr. K. C. Houston was appointed Assistant Professor of Chemistry, at a salary of \$1400.00 per annum.

The President presented the recommendation of Mr. Musselman, endorsed by Dean Snaw, in reference to the employment of an additional instructor in Farm Mechanics, at a salary not to exceed \$750.00 per annum. This was, on motion of Mr. Granam, approved.

On metion of Judge Carpenter, the following Deputy Nursery Inspectors, recommended by Prof. Taft, were appointed:

On motion of Mr. Waterbury, Miss Freyhoffer, Instructor in Music, was given leave of absence for the first three months of the college year with pay, she to furnish a substitute during that time.

Bulletin on President Snyder presented a letter from Prof. Barrows, in reference to the publication of a bulletin on "Birds or Michigan". On motion of appointed to Judge Carpenter, the Chair was directed to appoint a committee of two to report to the Board at its next meeting in reference to the extent of the edition and the probable cost of publication. The Chair appointed as such committee, Mr. Waterbury and the Secretary.

> On motion of Mr. Waterbury, Mr. Oliver Linton was appointed Instructor in Poultry Husbandry, to succeed Mr. Kempster, at a salary of \$1000.00 per annum, upon recommendation of Dean Snaw.

The Secretary presented a letter from Edwin F. Loud, in reference to right of way across certain lands owned by the College. On motion of Mr. Donerty, the above matter wasreferred to a committee of two, to be appointed by the Chair. The Chair appointed Messrs. Donerty and Wallace as such committee.

On motion of Mr. Waterbury, \$3500.00 was appropriated for the publication of bulletins for the present fiscal year.

to my office and ask your approval of the several items herein contained. It will, I am sure, be of interest to you to know that by exercising rather close economy, we have saved out of the tenth mill fund at the close of the past fiscal year, the sum of \$12,000.00. While it is possible that some small amount may be required from this balance to take care of "former year" bills, yet we do not expect this to be necessary. This amount then is available for special purposes and I recommend that \$5000.00 be set over to the Sundry Improvement account: the remainder should be sufficient to erect the experimental greenhouses for which the horticultural Department have long since asked.

In the reorganization of my office force since the death of Mr. Jenison, I have employed Miss Clara A. Hinman, a very competent accountant, as Assistant Cashier and Bookkeeper, at a salary of \$800.00, bond of \$5000.00 to be furnished by her and premium paid from M. A. C. Int. and Exechange fund. I have also placed Miss waisworth in the front office as a further assistant to the Cashier for the reason that the work there is entirely too heavy to be carried as it has been done, and allow Mr. Schepers the Cashier, to give the requisite amount of time to supervision and inspection. To fill the position of clerk and stenographer formerly held by Miss Walsworth, I have employed Miss Luella Harper, an experienced and capable stenographer, at a salary of \$600.00.

The satisfactory auditing of the trust funds in the hands of the Secretary, known as the M. A. C. Account, is a matter of much importance, especially in the light of recent events, and I ask for permission, if I do not now have that authority, to secure an annual audit of this account, the expense to be paid from the M. A. C. Interest and Exchange Fund.

I append to this report a brief statement of the defaulcation of the bookkeeper, Mr. Luther Jenison. On Wednesday afternoon, July 26th, after the close of business, and before Mr. Jenison had left the office, Mr. schepers discovered an error of \$1000.00 in the footing of Jenison's "daily balance". He promptly called the latter's attention to the matter. Jenison made some evasive reply, but when Schepers followed up his investigation and began footing the individual balances, Jenison called him aside and told him he had been taking funds and making fraudulent entries. Schepers then proceeded to check up the account and found the shortage to be \$3580.00, which Jenison said was the correct figure. I was out of town that day and came in at ten o'clock on receipt of a message from schepers. We tried to find Jenison that hight but did not succeed, and at about seven the next morning he shot himself. Mr. Chas. M. Turner examined the accounts at once, and made the following statement:—

Your request to examine the books and accounts of the late Luther Jenison, has been complied with by me, and I find that there is a total snortage of \$3580.00, as snown by his books, and trace the amount as follows:-

\$1000.00 in false deposit of July 3, 1911.

\$1000.00 false entry of checks issued July 10, 1911.

\$1000.00 error in credit footing snown on balance sheet, July 25, 1911.

\$580.00 embezzeled from cash on nand.

This latter item would necessarily be in small items taken from time to time from the cash and is not so easily located in the books without a long and exhaustive examination to show where each item had been appropriated by Jenison.

Appropriation for Sundry Improvements.

on motion of Mr. Oberderiver, the rollowing resolution appropriating Tunds for Sundry Improvements, was adopted:

Resolved. That there is hereby set apart for Sundry Improvements at Michigan Agricultural College, out of the unexpended balance of the tenthmill fund, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars. (\$5000.00)

On motion of Judge Carpenter, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, on April 28th, 1909, the State Board of Agriculture passed the following resolution, to wit:

Resolution regarding living quarters outside college grounds for literary societies.

"In accord with the expressed sentiment of between eighty and ninety per cent. of the alumni heard from, BE IT RESOLVED, that it shall be the policy of this institution to foster the dormitory system of housing students, andthat efforts will be made to increase as rapidly as possible dormitory accomodations, eating nails, and quarters for social purposes. Resolved, further, that this Board shall not give its consent to be erection of society nouses for living purposes, but it shall encourage the erection of houses by our literary societies for literary and social purposes, it being undestood that such nouses shall contain rooms for alumni and care takers.

"The building already erected off the grounds with the casent of and under the conditions laid down by the Board, shall not be disturbed in the enjoyment of the privileges aiready granted. The other societies living off the grounds in rented quarters shall be expected to occupy again rooms on the

campus when such rooms are properly provided. "We conceive it to be the auty of a Board placed in charge of an institution maintained by taxation to keep such an institution as far as possible within the reach of the average student. Therefore we adopt this policy and trust it may have the approval of the alumni and other friends of the institution to the end that the democratic spirit which has characterized the college in the past may be maintained, and that it may continue to be an institution where the sons and daughters of all citizens, without distinction, may secure an education which will fit them for the practical duties of life." and,

Whereas, the Hesperian Society is reported to have purchased a nouse outside the grounds of the michigan Agricultural College, to be used as living quarters for that society.

Therefore, be it kesolved: That we consider the action of the Hesperian Society in purchasing a society nouse for living purposes outside the grounds violate rule of the Michigan Agricultural College as a violation of the foregoing resolution, and said society is warned against continuing its aforesaid project,
