

MEETING OF THE
STATE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE

June 19, 1925

9:30 A.M.

I. CALL TO ORDER AND MINUTES

Present: President Butterfield, Mrs. Stockman, Messrs. McColl, Brody, McPherson, Watkins and Secretary Halladay.

II. REPORTS FROM THE PRESIDENT AND SECRETARY FOR RECORD OR INFORMATION.

The President reported that:

1. He had a letter from the Horse Show Committee expressing their appreciation of the cooperation of the Board.
2. A letter from Dr. Mayo, '88 approving the present method of publicity of State Board Business.
3. He had made the following Out-of-State Travel authorizations:

4. Leave of absence for Mr. W.E.J. Edwards for three months to attend graduate school at the Iowa State College. Mr. Edwards is to receive full pay, but is to reimburse the college for any help that it might be necessary to hire to do teaching work during his absence.

5. On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that the Don Burnham Memorial Fellowship fund of \$5,000 be accepted and that the President write the donors a vote of thanks.

"Established by Mr. A. C. Burnham, class of 1893 and his wife, Mrs. Madge Brodie Burnham, in memory of their son, Don, who died in 1906, age six years.

"For the benefit of Applied Science, the income of \$5,000 to be given to the graduate of M.S.C. each year, beginning with the graduates of 1926, male or female, who has earned at least half of his or her expenses during the preceding four years while attending College; who desires to remain in residence for another year and devote himself or herself to original study and research in the application of the known knowledge of any science to any of the problems of life, and who will teach three hours per week in that department in which his or her major work is done - to be given to that graduate who, in the judgment of the faculty, is most likely to add to the world's knowledge of the useful and practical applications of any science to any of the problems of life, preferably economic, social, psychological, or life-planning problems."

6. A report was made by the Secretary relative to the M.U.R. loop in which he stated notice had been given the railroad company to vacate as per their agreement but by consent they had agreed to remove the loop on July 6th.

7. Mr. Halladay presented a statement from Mr. Davidson, special accountant, concerning the budget condition.

On motion of Mr. McColl it was voted that the services of Mr. Davidson be continued until such time as the new system of accounting and book-keeping be put into operation.

8. The Secretary read a letter from the Michigan State Veterinary Medical Association relative to a new building for the work here.

III. RESIGNATIONS, APPOINTMENTS, SALARY ADJUSTMENTS, ETC., FOR RECORD OR CONFIRMATION.

1. President Butterfield recommended the appointment of Mr. C. R. Hoffer as Associate Professor of Sociology, effective June 23, 1925, at a salary at the rate of \$3500 per year (11 months basis).

On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that the appointment be confirmed.

2. The President recommended that the resignation of Mr. W. B. Jones, Supt. of Official Testing, be accepted, same to become effective July 15, 1925.

On motion of Mr. McPherson it was voted that the resignation be accepted.

1. Dr. Huston presented to the members of the Board the recommendation of the Athletic Board of Control concerning Athletic Insignia.

2. Dr. Huston, on behalf of the Athletic Board of control, raised the question of Stadium payments.

On motion of Mrs. Stockman it was voted that the State Board recommend that as much be paid on the Stadium as is available after all claims have been paid.

3. The President recommended that Dean Bissell's request, that Mr. Sefing be paid \$500 for two months during the summer for investigations in the Engineering Experiment Station, be accepted.

On motion of Mr. McColl it was voted to pay Mr. Sefing \$500.

4. The President reported that he had asked Dean Shaw to serve as Chairman of a special committee to investigate the Menominee County School project and Dean Shaw presented a report of the committee and outlined plans already in mind. The President further recommended that this committee with such additions as may be desirable, be made a committee to serve for two years as the Committee in Charge of the Menominee County Agricultural School. Committee: Dean Shaw, Prof. Cox, Mr. Hill, Mr. Putnam and Mr. Phelan.

On motion of Mr. McPherson it was voted that the report of Dean Shaw be accepted and that a copy be placed on file in the Secretary's office.

5. The President recommended that the Board reimburse the Upper Peninsula Boy's and Girls Club for the material lost in the Chatham fire. The amount of loss is \$1024.43

On motion of Mrs. Stockman it was voted that an amount not to exceed \$1000 be appropriated to replace the material lost and that the matter be turned over to the Purchasing Agent of the college.

6. Dean Ryder reported recommendation from the Administrative Committee concerning the degree of Bachelor of Arts for Mr. Alfred F. Westphal.

On motion of Mr. Watkins it was voted that the matter be left to the President.

7. On motion of Mr. Watkins it was voted that the matter relative to the conferring of a degree on Willard Hopkins be referred to the President.

8. The President reported a plan drawn up by the Extension Service and endorsed by Dean Shaw relative to statement of purpose and policy of County Councils of Agriculture and Country Life and recommended that the matter be left to the Board Committee and the President with power.

On motion of Mr. Watkins it was voted that the recommendation be adopted.

9. Secretary Halladay raised a question concerning time of workmen on the grounds.

On motion of Mr. McPherson it was voted that the whistle should be the signal for laborers to go to work and to quit and that orders be posted to this effect.

10. Secretary Halladay raised a question in regard to the cost of upkeep of the park in the double row of Elms.

On motion of Mr. McColl it was voted that the suggestion made by Alderman Hallman, that the expense of the upkeep of the strip between the driveways of the boulevard along the north line of the campus, be equally divided between the city of East Lansing and the college, be accepted.

2. On motion of Mr. Watkins it was voted that the Union Literary Society be offered the use of a house owned by the college on Charles street for the coming year in exchange for the use of the Union Literary house.

3. On motion of Mr. Brody it was voted that the Purchasing Agent's car be turned in toward a new one and that the Secretary be directed to make the exchange.

4. On motion of Mrs. Stockman it was voted that the next meeting of the Board be held Wednesday July 29th, at 9 a.m.



