Meeting of the State Board of Agriculture

March 15, 1934

Present: Messrs. Brody, Chairman; Berkey, Daane, Downing, Halstead; Mr. Elliott, representing the Superintendent of Public Instruction; President Shaw and Secretary Halladay. Absent: Mrs. Wilson The meeting was called to order at 1:30 P.M., the board members having convened for luncheon in the Womans Building at 12 o'clock. The minutes of the February 15th meeting were approved with the following correction in item 7 under "Miscellaneous": By action of the Board, the service charge (steam, water, and electricity) against the Wells Hall Boarding Club was set at \$50.00 per month during the present school year and \$150.00 was to be charged for each of the last two terms of 1932-1933. The recommendation of the committee was that \$50.00 per month be charged during the school year (as approved), but that the sum of \$150.00 for both of the terms in 1932-1935 (i.e., at the rate of \$75.00 per term) be set as payment.
