The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

President Snyder presented the following communication from Professor Shaw in regard to field work:-

East Lansing, Mich.,

February 23, 1909.

President J. L. Snyder,

East Lansing, Michigan. Dear Sir,-

About one year ago the State Board of Agriculture authorized the establishment of extension work along Animal Husbandry lines. The efforts during a part of this time consisted in presenting a plan to stimulate live stock

improvement in the state through the establishment of co-operative breeders! associations. In this work a field agent has been employed for about five Communicamonths at a cost not to exceed a few hundred dollars. The results as given in tion from: circular 4, have been simply amazing, and it seems as though a wave of reform Mr. Shaw in in improved cattle breeding has begun to sweep over the state. regard to I hereby recommend that extension work be established also along the lines field work. of soils, crops and horticulture. I am satisfied that the work of the College and Experiment Station can be placed before the people of the state in an impressive manner that will produce speedy results in the improvement of our agricultural conditions in general. If possible it seems desirable that these lines of work be started immediately. It should be undertaken in a very moderate way for the first year

at least without involving the expenditure of unduly large sums of money till the plan is tried out. Because of the character of this work, Experiment Station funds ought not to be used and the projects would therefore have to be supported by funds secured from state sources.

Mr. Shaw's communicat tion in regard to field work. The live stock work in progress should be continued and developed. During the first year one man could conduct the work in soils and crops, involving an expenditure of about \$600.00 for salary besides traveling expenses. For the Horticultural work a man would need to be employed at about \$1200.00 per year and in addition to this there would be the expense involved in traveling, demonstrations, etc. (See accompanying note from Prof. Eustace.) The men engaged in these lines of work during the summer season would be needed as instructors, institute lecturers, etc. during the winter season.

After having consulted with you regarding these plans I believe further detail will be unnecessary.
