
### GENE GERMAN

# . . . and so it began

It's a good thing we came early or we would have had trouble getting good seats. Already the crowd was filling the bleachers and the shore along the Red Cedar. I just couldn't imagine what the Water Carnival would be like.

The night was just perfect and the music from the bandstand floating across the water created a romantic atmosphere. Jim was talking with some friends sitting in front of us and I hated to pry him with questions even though this was my first Water Carnival.

I began to wonder, though, just how the Water Carnival had originated. Finally, taking my pride in hand, I posed the question to Jim.

"Well, you'd never believe it," he replied, "but Indians used to paddle their canoes right past this very spot. After the founding of MAC, Spartans continued to enjoy this same water sport. Just for novelty, they began to have canoe-tilts and races which became popular just like our athletic events of today.

"Since water sports were becoming so popular, somebody came up with the idea of having an all-college water event. But then along came World War I and the idea was forgotten. Shortly after the war a group of students presented the first spring pageant along the Red Cedar.

"Then in 1920, the senior class gave a Mardi Gras along with a canoe parade, and so the Spring Pageant became the Festival of May-time. In 1921 canoe tilts continued to be popular and one of the newly developed Canoe Clubs added the activity to commencement week festivities.

"Nobody can decide for sure when the first Canoe Carnival, which had only a few floats, was held; it was either in 1922 or 1923."

By this time, the people sitting around us had begun to listen to Jim's description of the history of the Water Carnival. I could tell they didn't know much about its origin either.

"'Song of Our Times,' was the theme for the first splash pageant," continued Jim, "and individual floats had names like 'Time Out for Tears,' and 'It's Been a Long, Long Time.' "Then, about 1927, the seniors who had always handled the Water Carnival, gave the job to the Water Carnival Board, which was appointed by the class president. The theme that year was 'Worship of the Spartan Gods.'

"The next year, the theme was something real elaborate, 'Fantasy of Romantic Figures of History and Folklore.'

"I can't remember some of the themes after that, but in 1934 it was conservative and historical, 'Milestones of Michigan.'

"During the depression, there wasn't much time and money for Water Carnivals, but in 1936 they turned to fantasy again with 'Ballads in Tandem,' using floats like 'Night in Fairyland.'

"In fact, they continued to use these fantasy ideas until 1942. Things were looking pretty black in the world about then and so they used the theme 'All Out for Victory.' This brought an end to the carnivals for the duration.

"So by the time 1947 rolled around, they went all out with the musical, 'Songs We All Know.'

"In 1950, the senior class thought that Life Magazine was going to run a feature on the Water Carnival. The committee spent \$400 to dye the Red Cedar red, and then the photographers didn't show up. The theme was 'Mid-Centurama,' commemorating the past and predicting the future.

"The 1952 'Laugh and Smile Film Antics Style' drew the largest opening night crowd since the Carnival began. 'Go for Broke' was the winning float.

"Then last year, of course, was 'The World We Inhabit,' with the floats representing popular American advertisements. First place went to 'Body by Fisher.'"

A hush fell over the audience as the announcer began to present the first float. I was glad that I'd asked Jim about the history of the Water Carnival, though I was still wondering how he knew so much about it. I sat back and relaxed as the first float rounded the bend.



### DORIS HUMES RECORDING SECRETARY

A Music Major from Lansing, Doris has been very active during her four years at MSC. At present she is president of Mortar Board, senior women's honorary, and a member of Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority. In the past she has served as co-chairman of the 1953 J-Hop, president of Tower Guard, sophomore women's honorary, and as a member of Frosh-Soph Council. In addition, Doris is a member of Delta Omicron, music honorary; Kappa Delta Pi, education honorary; Tau Sigma, science and arts honorary; and Phi Kappa Phi.
