





The interdenominational chapel was built to honor the many MSU students and alumni who fought and died while serving in our nation's armed services. Built solely through the efforts of over 5,000 alumni and friends, they raised the \$200,000 necessary for its construction.

Adding historical significance, college architect Ralph Calder incorporated 30 stones into the walls of the quaint English Tudor style building. The stones were gracious gifts from European cathedrals, which were bombed into ruins during World War II. Stones from Westminster Abbey and the White House were also included in the design.

Helping to make the chapel a popular setting for special occasions are the 38 stained glass windows that encircle the chapel's wooden pews. Designed by the Willet Stained Glass Studios of Philadelphia, the windows are arranged in groups of three and depict events in the university's history and reflect ideals of the colleges.

Nestled on the banks of the Red Cedar River, the chapel seats approximately 200 people and accommodates all faiths. Care and reverence is given to each ceremony held in its picturesque setting. Every wedding, baptism, memorial service or other religious service held by students, faculty, staff or alumni is unique and memorable. Dedication and a commitment to excellence have lead to the MSU Alumni Memorial Chapel's success.
