STUDENTS' COUNCIL

For the future settlement of all class matters and the maintenance of the college traditions and customs a Students' Council shall be formed, such Council to consist of three seniors, two

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juniors, and one sophomore, to be elected by the classes named the first week of each fall term. The officers to be a president from the seniors and a secretary from the juniors.

REGULATIONS AND CUSTOMS

I. Class numerals can be worn only by members of its football, baseball, basket ball, or track teams, or by those who have earned a position on the first or second varsity teams, and then only when these numerals have been awarded by the Athletic Council upon the recommendation of the class.

II. Each and every freshman and sub-freshman shall wear at all times during the fall and spring terms, except on Sunday, caps of the following descriptions: For freshmen, an official brown cap with a small visor and a green button, (amended, that present freshmen caps be worn for remainder of this year); for sub-freshmen, a gray cap with a black button. They shall not at any time while in college wear a pin representtheir preparatory school in any manner, nor shall they wear any emblem or insignia of that institution.

III. "Student night" shall be the last Thursday night of the spring term, when a celebration in the form of a "Night Shirt Parade" shall be held under the supervision of the Junior class. At this time the freshmen and sub-freshmen caps shall be burned. All classes shall participate in this celebration.

IV. No freshman or sub-freshman shall be allowed to go without a cap or hat about the campus.

V. There shall be no hazing. Occasionally some individual first year man may be made to feel that one can know too much from the first, but hazing is severely condemned as a general practice.

VI. The old class rushes have been abolished and the "Organized Rush" on the second Saturday of the fall term substituted.

VII. No student shall be allowed to loaf around the college barber shop.

VIII. Freshmen and sub-freshmen shall at all times show due respect to upper classmen.

IX. All students shall show their respect to college professors by tipping their hats.

X. The most important social function of the college course is the "Junior Hop," given by each class during the winter term of its junior year.

XI. The week of commencement shall be known as "Senior Week."

PRIVILEGE

I. Only seniors shall be allowed to wear stiff hats about the campus.

TRADITION

I. A time honored tradition at M. A. C. is that no student shall smoke on the campus.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

Alpha Zeta—In 1902 a chapter of the Alpha Zeta fraternity was installed at the college. It is the aim of the fraternity to honor students who have distinguished themselves in agricultural studies.

College Band—The students maintain a musical association known as the College Band, in charge of the military department.

Debating Club – The Debating Club holds weekly meetings during the college sessions, the main feature of each program being a debate between members selected by the club. For several

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years a debate has been held with the Ypsilanti normal during the spring term. This department is as important as athletics.

Farmers' Club—The Farmers' Club is a society composed of agricultural students, having for its object the study and discussion of practical up-to-date questions in agriculture.

Its plan of organization is identical with that of the regular Farmers' Club, and it is one of the units of that great Association of Farmers' Clubs of Michigan, sending delegates to the state meetings. It was organized December 6, 1899.

The club is a very wide-awake organization and its meetings are very largely attended.

Foresters' Club—An organization of forestry students and others interested in forestry which meets each alternate Tuesday evening forms a valuable adjunct to the course.

Horticultural Club—For those interested in horticulture a club has been organized which meets every week during the college sessions.

Engineering Society—A club has been organized by the engineering students to discuss subjects relating to mechanical, civil and electrical engineering. Weekly meetings are held in the physics lecture room at which papers are read and discussed. Non-resident engineers of note in their respective lines frequently appear before the engineering students under the auspices of this society.

All engineering students are urged to become members.

Prohibition League—This is an organization for the purpose of studying the saloon question from economic standpoint.

LIBERAL ARTS UNION

The Liberal Arts Union is an organization among students and faculty. It is designed to promote those interests not falling within the

ARTICLE I-NAME

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be: The Young Men's Christian Association of the Michigan Agricultural College.

ARTICLE II-OBJECT

Section 1. The object of this Association shall be, the development of Christian manhood and good fellowship among its members and the promotion of Christian work, especially among students.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The members of this Association shall be classed as Active, Associate, Honorary and Sustaining.

Section 2. Active membership of this Association shall consist of students of this institution who are members in good standing of an evangelical church and have been approved by a majority of the membership committee. Only active members shall have the right to vote and hold office.

Section 3. The associate membership of this Association shall consist of students of good moral character who have been approved by a majority of the membership committee.

Section 4. The honorary membership of this Association shall consist of all alumni members and such members of the faculty as the membership committee consider are entitled to membership, because of their especial interest shown in the work of the Association.

Section 5. Sustaining membership of this Association shall consist of persons who otherwise than by regular dues contribute to the work of the Association.

Section 6. Dues for active or associate members shall be \$1.50 per year.
