Many of the leaders in our student groups come out of the Council. There is real opportunity for the development of leadership abilities and for the cultivation of close and helpful fellowship.

The hike and picnic for first year girls during Freshman Week acquaint the co-eds with the Y. W. C. A. organization and personnel. There is a membership drive during fall term when girls are urged to join. Membership in the association is the requirement for voting on Y. W. C. A. officers at the all-college election at the close of the winter term. A donation is optional since no dues are charged. Recruits to the various committees are thus signified and also obtained by individual application for membership to the particular committee chairman any time during the year. Worthwhile and informative general meeting programs are given on a month on notification.

Specific activities other than committee procedure include: the Waffle Breakfast at Homecoming; a Christmas party for underprivileged children financed by Tag Day; the May Morning Breakfast for campus girls and their mothers; sale of American Legion Poppies in Lansing and East Lansing; participation in the Freshman Councillor movement with Frances Sullivan, Elizabeth Baker, and Jean Anderson as delegates; periodical vesper services announced by bulletin board and State News items; attendance of delegates at the Geneva Conference for the furtherance of leadership among college women at Lake Geneva, Wisconsin.

Work with the Y. M. C. A. to stage various functions is obtained in: the Freshman Mixer during Freshman Week for men and girls; All Nations' Banquet for foreign students of the campus on Lincoln's Birthday; Religious Council retreat for officers and committee chairmen of the five religious organizations for the purpose of planning a schedule for the coming school year.

Miss Emma Sater as student woman advisor and executive secretary of the Y. W. C. A., succeeds Miss Neva M. Lovewell in that position at the Peoples Church. Miss Sater has excellent qualifications for the place, having served in a like capacity at the First Congregational Church of Madison, Wisconsin, for the past six years. She studied at Morningside College, Sioux City, Iowa; and Cornell University; was graduated from Northwestern University, and took postgraduate work at the University of Chicago.

Student-Faculty Friendship Groups

A Feature of the Y. M. C. A. at M. S. C.

What Are They ? ? ?

Sponsored by the 'Y' yet the groups are for all students, men and women. They convene at about 7:30 on specified Sunday nights, two in the Fall Term, four in the Winter, and two in the Spring. The Meeting places are the homes of interested faculty folk.

What Is Their Purpose ? ? ?

1. The promotion of helpful student-faculty friendships.
2. The stimulation of the spiritual and intellectual life of the campus community.
3. To give a knowledge of the best current books on religion and magazine articles on religion.
4. To help us to give the reason for the faith which is in us by thinking through the great changes which have affected the religious life.
5. Student fellowship and friendship upon an easy, natural basis, unmarked by class distinctions of any kind.

How Are They Formed ? ? ?

"Sign-up" cards are passed at student gatherings in the church or posted on the campus. Invitations are sent to the people signing up to some particular faculty home. The host and student leader work together on this matter and the program. In case any find they cannot attend, we emphasize strongly that **courtesy demands** that they telephone their regrets.

What Is The Program ? ? ?

The host and hostess are under no obligation to provide a program unless they so desire. A few prefer a social gathering. The majority prefer that the committee in charge make all arrangements for the program.

Usually a book review, briefly and tersely presented by a capable leader, members of the Credit Courses in Religion, and others, furnishes the basis for the program. This serves to create background, and then usually the professor, out of his more mature experience is able to help and guide the discussion, aiding the student leader in bringing out the more reticent members of the group.
