personal satisfaction to me to be able to see that some public recognition is given your work along these lines. You are a self-effacing individual who never cares for the credit but is interested in getting the work done. Eventually several million readers are going to read this foreword, and I personally am glad that this will make for some measure of public recognition.

However, far above and beyond all this personal feeling is the fact that public interest is going to be an enormous factor in the growth and success of police science. The average citizen is not interested in the abstract. There must be some personal application in order to arouse and hold that interest, and therefore this foreword has a field that transcends any personal satisfaction I may derive from it and which must obliterate any feelings of undue modesty you may have.

Thayer Hobson understands this and won't make any changes which are designed to detract from the idea I am trying to convey, but, on the other hand, he is naturally very anxious to make certain that there are no factual inaccuracies in these forewords.

I am trying to make the mail with this so I have dashed this out in a hurry. Thayer Hobson will give it a little editorial polishing if that is necessary, but mainly we are interested in accuracy, and, of course, aside from the fact that we don't want you to go modest on us we want your approval.


