Those who attended the open hearings conducted by the Michigan State Senate and those who observed from the House gallery were fascinated by what passes for the legislative process in the State of Michigan.

The Representatives and Senators who were to debate (and hopefully vote on) the proposed Equal Rights Amendment to the U.S. Constitution apparently had done little or no homework on the issue. Senator Cooper's main concern was the impact the Amendment would have on girls' interscholastic sports; members of the House were concerned about "resolutions" against the amendment submitted by their secretaries. (These resolutions by the secretaries dealt with issues like, "Whereas, We would rather pound a typewriter than pound a rivet, and are desirous that bulging biceps remain physical attributes of the male;....)
