FIRST HOME GAME.

Detroit College and M. A. C. played the first home game Saturday on the new field. The contest was a pretty exhibition of individual playing on the part of M. A. C., and a commendable display of pluck against odds on the part of Detroit.

At 3:30 M. A. C. took the east goal and kicked off. Detroit could not gain and was forced to punt. M. A. C. worked the ball down to Detroit's five-yard line where it was lost. Detroit soon punted and M. A. C. again took the ball down the field—this time for a touchdown, and after eleven minutes of play, Childs kicked goal.

In the same way the second touchdown was made by Childs towards the close of the first half. M. A. C. did not catch the kick out and consequently lost the try for goal. Score: M. A. C., 11; Detroit, 0.

The second half ended with the ball in the possession of M. A. C. near Detroit's goal line. Peters, Kratz, Drew, Childs and Smith made big gains at times, but fumbling and lack of team work kept down the score.

TWO M. A. C. FARMER BOYS GOING TO THE STATE SENATE.

'81. Some years ago while a student at M. A. C., Jason Woodman '81, attended numerous granges in the vicinity of the College and talked in an entertaining manner. He frequently dwelt on the advantages of a good education for the farmer and was sure that he saw a capital opportunity for the young educated man to make himself useful to the community in which he lived, and if he had lurking about him anywhere an aspiration for political honors, there was no better place to start than on the farm. Mr. Woodman went to work with a will and with success on his farm, and incidentally served several terms as lecturer of the State Grange.

'93. A. B. Cook, '93, as soon after graduating as possible, took his father's farm near Owosso, to manage. He had anticipated the pleasure of such work long before graduation. He was not twenty-one when he began the work. He was a successful farmer from the start, and in less than ten years has served as

secretary of the State organization of Farmers' Clubs and is now its president.

Both of these farmer boys have recently been nominated to serve in the State senate. Usually it is expected that a man before going to the legislature must serve as supervisor of his township for several years and thus learn to manipulate the wires, and possibly occupy some office in the county, and then he stands a chance to get elected to the House of Representatives. After a few more years, if things go his way, he may be elected to the Senate, but not usually till considerable past middle life. But in these cases the agricultural education and after work among the farmers enabled these young men to jump some of the usual preliminary steps, such as serving in the House of Representatives, and receive a nomination to the Senate. Judging from all previous signs and records, we feel sure that they will both be elected and will make substantial members of the State Senate.
