LIBERAL ARTS UNION—ENTERTAINMENT COURSE.

The attention of the readers of the RECORD is invited to the very excellent entertainment course offered by the Liberal Arts Union to the college people and others who may be fortunate enough to secure tickets. The numbers and dates are as follows:

Season tickets are sold at \$2 for the six numbers, and can be obtained at Secretary Brown's office, where seats can be also reserved prior to each entertainment without extra cost.

Mme. Rita Fornia is a *prima donna* soprano from the Metropolitan Opera Company of New York City. She is a native American, born in San Francisco and has studied abroad for several years, and has had the advantage of special training under Jean de Reszke, and has sung in English, German and Italian opera, taking the principal role under such managers as Savage and Conried. She will be supported by the Kaltenborn String Quartette and a competent accompanist. The quartette is well known of its own merits and will render an excellent program of duets, trios and quartettes and violin and cello solos.

Dr. Edward Burton MacDowell is a widely traveled and educated lecturer and correspondent. The subject of his lecture will be the Panama Canal, a project of great moment and interest to all, and will be splendidly illustrated with lantern slides and moving pictures showing the scenery of the canal zone and the methods and progress of the digging of the great ditch.

Lorado Taft, in addition to being one of the foremost of American sculptors, has the happy faculty of taking and holding an audience as he tells about his work. He brings to the lecture platform the complete paraphernalia of the sculptor's studio and in the presence of the audience shows how plastic clay is shaped into artistic and beautiful forms and made permanent in the plaster cast. His subject is "A Glimpse of a Sculptor's Studio, or How Statues are Made." The writer is personally acquainted with Mr. Taft, has heard his lectures and knows that no one can afford to miss the opportunity to hear him.

Gov. E. W. Hoch, while governor of Kansas, was instrumental in securing to that state radical but much needed legislation for the control of corporations, the revision of taxation, pure food, judicial reforms, etc., and became thereby a national figure. He is a man of principle, and earnest conviction and has a forceful way of presenting his views whether in public or private. By means of these qualities of mind

and manner he is in great demand as a public speaker on economic subjects.

The May Festival is happily an established institution at M. A. C. The M. A. C. Chorus, which has undertaken to present two concerts at the May Festival will be under the direction of Mr. Killeen and will be assisted by outside talent of known ability.

The program this year will be of a lighter character than formerly and there can be no doubt as to the artistic success of this musical event.

The entire progress of the course should appeal to every one for its variety and excellence. The expense connected with the enterprise is large, and hearty and generous support for the undertaking is asked of the students, faculty and community.

Herschel B. Lazell.

Herschel Bouton Lazell, with '91, was born at the home of his grandfather Lazell, August 22, 1866, in Eaton county, Mich. At the age of two years his parents moved to Grand Ledge, where he attended the village school and worked with his father. When he was 20 years old he entered the class of '91, but before he had completed the course here he went to Colorado, where he remained until 1893. After studying law for a period of three years in the offices of Cassius Alexander of Grand Ledge and A. A. Ellis of Ionia he was admitted to practice and later appointed State reporter by the supreme court of Michigan.

Death is the result of tuberculosis, which developed from a severe attack of typhoid fever last fall. It was only with strenuous efforts that he had been able to exercise the duties of the office. He was removed to Bellevue September 13, where it was hoped he might regain his strength, but with no avail.

He is survived by his wife, one son, John B. Lazell, and one step-daughter, Miss Jessie Tompkins, of Lansing. The funeral services were held Friday afternoon at the home.
