MICHIGAN MEETING OF ASS'N OF COLLEGIATE ALUMNAE.

The State Conference of the Michigan Branches of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae was held here Friday and Saturday, November 23d and 24th. Afternoon tea was served at the Woman's Building Friday afternoon from 4 to 6 o'clock. At 6:30 a banquet was served at the Senior House, during which music was furnished by the Bemis Trio. The banquet was followed by an address, "The College Woman's Work," by Mrs. Gertrude S. Martin, of Ithaca, N. Y., executive secretary of the Association.

The Saturday morning meeting was held at the Plymouth Congregational church in Lansing, beginning at 9 o'clock. A general survey of A. C. A. was given by Mrs. Martin and Mrs. F. N. Scott, state secretary, followed by a round table discussion by delegates from Detroit, Ann Arbor, Kalamazoo and Lansing.

The principle address of the morning meeting was given by Mrs. Lois Kimball Mathews, National president of A. C. A. and dean of women at the University of Wisconsin, on the subject of "A. C. A. and the War." She said in part:

"War has always brought to women great opportunities, great obligations and great privileges. The reason we are now college women is because of the great conflicts that have taken place in the past. Vassar college was established in 1865, and other institutions of higher learning opened their doors to women after the Civil War. The colleges and universities came into being for women to prepare them to take their places in the schools where they were needed and in the places that the men could no longer take.

"If we don't win this war we shall have lost the finest things for which women strive. We must say to people, 'We must stay in this war until the fight for democracy is settled. We must look beyond the war. This war is for peace. We are in it to fight and to win, and then when it is over we will stand with the forces to police the world for peace.'"

Music was furnished at this meeting by Mrs. Roy Moore and the Matinee Musical Quintette. Luncheon was served at 12:30.

The Lansing Branch has a membership of about 70. The officers are Miss Norma Gilchrist, president, Miss Nina Bristol, vice-president, Miss Mabel Mosher, secretary-treasurer, Mrs. R. C. Huston, councillor, Miss Antoinette Robson and Miss Emma Lott, directors.

COLLEGE HALL TO BE RESTORED.

At the November meeting of the State Board of Agriculture action was taken to begin work at once for the restoration of College Hall. The work is to be placed in charge of a contractor and the work done by the day. Architect Bowd has been directed to make plans for the work and a committee of alumni will soon be appointed to oversee and watch the progress of the restoration.

In the action of the board it was specified that the exterior and chapel are to be left just as they are.

The Board's action comes as the result of a hard and persistent fight by alumni and former students. Much of the credit for the winning of the

long fight is due to the efforts of the late Prof. Gulley, '68, Judge Carpenter, '79, Henry Haigh, '74, and John Beaumont, '87.

SERVICE FLAG UNFURLED.

M. A. C.'s honor roll of nearly 500 names is now represented by a service flag, which was first seen by the student body when it was unfurled at the mass meeting last Friday night. A thrill of pride went through the assemblage, as the band played "The Star Spangled Banner," and the big flag dropped from its furling. Some eyes were wet and not a few throats choked with emotion when the crowd realized that for each of the 468 stars then on the flag there is an M. A. C. man somewhere "out there" in the service of his country. The flag was again shown at the Syracuse game last Saturday, where it was greeted with the National Anthem from the band, and a chorus of cheers from the bleachers.

The stars are of blue felt placed on a 4x8 white field, which is surrounded by a two foot margin of red. This makes the flag eight feet wide by 12 feet long, the entire background being of broadcloth. Sufficient room is left on the white field to add more stars as the reports come in that other M. A. C. men have responded to the call of the Nation and of Democracy.

The college is indebted to several of the instructors in the Home Economics department, Mrs. Peppard, Miss Casho, Miss Smiley, Miss Biglow, Miss Stoll, Miss Clemens, and Miss Hunt for their work in making this beautiful emblem of honor and loyalty. The flag will be hung in the library but will be available at any time for decoration for college functions.

FARM JOURNALISTS JOIN RECORD STAFF.

THE FOOTBALL SEASON.

With the Syracuse game Saturday there was brought to a close the most remarkable football season in M. A. C. history. For never before has such ill luck followed an M. A. C. team throughout its entire season. Never before have we failed to win a single game on the schedule; never before has a team playing a season of hard luck put up such a battle as a climax, and never has the student body shown such loyal and unqualified support to a team and followed it as faithfully through one loss after another to the referee's whistle of the last lost game. Of the students' support to the team Director Brewer says, "In the entire history of college athletics there has been no finer display of a student body's backing the team than was shown here at M. A. C. this fall."

With but three old men back and only the greenest of new material both team and student body started in to play the game for all there was in it. We did not send men out during the spring and summer asking our old football players not to enlist till after the football season was over as was done at several institutions in the middle west. Rather it has been Director Brewer's policy to urge men to enlist for from his summer's work in the camps he realizes how badly the army needs trained athletes as officers and leaders. Nor did we lose heart altogether and cancel our schedule, as a number of institutions did this fall. We began the season with the notion of Uncle Sam first and M. A. C. next. Fully cognizant of war conditions and our lack of material, Director Brewer's attitude straight through has been that of making us do the best we could with what we had and finishing the season fighting. Sparks, of Cornell, whose football ranks were hard hit by the war, said early in the fall, "I don't give a d— if we don't win a game." With the stars in our service flag increasing, those were M. A. C.'s sentiments ex-

cept that we were going to fight hard to win.

The Syracuse game was typical of every game this season. Those home-comers who witnessed it were favored with a fair sample of the season's trend. They saw M. A. C. outfight Syracuse and although 25 pounds lighter per man, they saw our men make consistent gains in all directions and stop the heavy line plunges of Syracuse. But when the element of luck entered, it was just as it has been in every game this season—M. A. C. wasn't there. Whenever flukes happened they happened for the other fellow.

But even with such luck the student body has stood behind loyally. There has been no knocking. After the Notre Dame game in which M. A. C. was beaten 23-0 the student body with the band turned out at midnight to meet the team. They've followed faithfully from one defeat to the next and their backing has given the varsity courage and fight. And for a team that hadn't won a game through the season they outdid themselves in the last fight. The score was far from representative of the struggle.

Our season's losses haven't hurt our standing in collegiate circles one bit. In fact, we are being given a lot of credit for the fighting finish we made. And the team and the student body deserve it for they have made a wonderful showing, a showing we may all well be proud of.

Winning teams don't go hand in hand with starry service flags.

useful experience in the gathering and handling of news stories, while the RECORD editor will be relieved thereby of considerable routine reporting work and will be given more time for editing and constructive work. One at a time members of the class will be taken to the printers to help in the "make up" of the type matter and learn something of printing and the mechanical side of journalism. The news assignments as they are written up will be read and graded by Mr. Hasselman before they are turned over to the RECORD. It is hoped that the scheme will work out advantageously to both of us and that it may become a permanent arrangement.

HOME COMING EVENTS.

From the standpoint of attendance the annual homecoming was not all that was desired although no doubt it was as much as could be expected in such times as these. It is estimated that about 250 came out for the game although those registered were only a few over 100. A large aggregation from Camp Custer, M. A. C. officers and men and followers of the 310th Ambulance football team who played the all-fresh team added their part to the home-coming contingent.

THE MASS MEETING.

The opening number of the Home Coming program, the "Old Timers' mass meeting, on Friday evening, November 23, was one of the largest and most successful football pep fests yet held in the Armory. Quite a number of alumni were present. The yell-masters, Tommy Dee and Bill McKnight, and the band were the centers of attraction for some time until the regular program started.

As is the annual custom each of the men's "dorms" put on a little vaudeville performance. The Holy Roller Society of M. A. C. from Abbot Hall staged a prayer meeting in which the leader cleverly quoting the scripture to his purpose, "invoked the powers for a victory on the morrow as a fitting conclusion to the seven practice games of the season." Williams Hall, which is largely a freshman stronghold this year, put on a spirited boxing match between Kid M. A. C. a lightweight, and 250-pound Kid Syracuse. Needless to say the visiting pugilist was knocked out in the fourth quarter.

Wells Hall brought forth a Bijou conducted by a master of ceremonies in full dress and consisting of every-

thing from painted ladies to stolid wielders of the knitting needle. A Jazz Band, Minstrel Troupe, and two dance numbers in costume (?) were features.

At the conclusion of the stunts F. A. Davis, president of the Student council, introduced Mr. Howard Rath-er, '17, as toastmaster. Rather first called upon "Jimmie" Hasselman, "fac-ulty bell-hop," to represent the fac-ulty. The popular English instructor owned to the correctness of the "bell-hop" appellation for as he said he was paging for President Kedzie and Pro-fessor French, both of whom failed to appear as scheduled.

Clarence E. Holmes, '93, the next speaker, tintured his crisp oratory on college spirit with some reminiscences. Calling attention to the frequent and prominent displaying of "bottles," by the Williams Hall-ites in their stunt he remarked that he was glad to know that Williams Hall was still "wet" but in his time they had it mostly in sacks, and that it was never dry under the windows.

At the conclusion of Mr. Holmes' speech a service flag, 8x12 feet, carry-ing nearly 500 stars, was unfurled while the band played "The Star Spangled Banner." Judge Collingwood, '85, fired his hearers with enthusiasm for the flag and what it symbolized and added "when we realize that each star in that flag represents an M. A. C. man in the service of our govern-ment, we know one reason why our football team has been less successful than in past seasons."

Norm Weil, '17, varsity football manager of last season, was called upon for remarks. Weil who is now in the service came from camp at Al-lentown, Pa., for the meeting. He ex-pressed the great pleasure an alumnus finds in getting back and meeting old friends.

Captain Coryell, whose football ca-reer ended with the Syracuse game,

sincerely thanked the student body for the very loyal support the team re-ceived at their hands during the entire season. In the absence of Coach Brewer, trainer "Jimmy" Dugan was called upon and responded in a man-ner characteristic of the "big league" trainer.

The meeting ended with a short yell practice and a selection by the band.

THE HOME COMING LUNCHEON.

About 100 enthusiastic Home-comers attended the alumni luncheon Satur-day noon, November 24. Following a reception and get-together in the Un-ion Literary house, the assemblage went down to a club style lunch in Club D. Judge Collingwood took charge of the meeting in the absence of President Prudden who could not leave his duties as coal administrator. Because of the early time set for the football game, it was necessary to hurry the program a little more than was desired. President Kedzie, A. C. Burnham, '93, Mrs. E. W. Ranney, '99, J. W. Beaumont, '82, and Capt. Walter Wright, '17 of Camp Custer, respond-ed to the toastmaster's call for short talks after which all joined in singing America. The service flag hung at one end of the dining room and was referred to by almost everyone of the speakers.

IN HARD FOUGHT 7-7 BATTLE SY-RACUSE WINS 21-7.

About 300 homecomers saw an ex-hibition of the old M. A. C. fighting spirit on College Field Saturday when M. A. C. fought Syracuse a battle in which the score should have been 7-7, but which finally stood on the board 21-7 in favor of Syracuse. As the final windup of a season of mishaps and ill luck, Brewer's men came back in the last game for the hardest battle they have fought this season.

Although outweighed twenty-five pounds per man they made consistent gains both in line plunging and end-running and held Syracuse as no one dreamed they would be able to do. A 7-7 score would have been very repre-sentative of the battle put up by the two opponents. In straight football M. A. C. played Syracuse an even game, but end runs, two of which were on clear flukes, were our undoing.

In the first quarter Hammes kicked off to Steel and Syracuse advanced the ball for two first downs, but was stopped in the middle of the field. A see-saw game followed, which was suddenly terminated toward the end of the quarter when Meehan re-covering a fumble, slipped and eeled his way down the field for seventy-five yards for a touchdown, which he fol-lowed with a successful goal kick. This first score by the opponents had the effect of firing the old comeback spirit and a stonewall line of defense was immediately put against Syracuse. Bassett and Snider carried the ball for two first downs when it came in their possession and Archer made a splendid pass to Ramsay who dropped behind the goal line for M. A. C.'s first touchdown. Hammes kicked goal. First half stood 7-7.

Early in the third quarter with M. A. C. playing splendid straight foot-ball a fumbled pass to Ramsay was grabbed up by Swartzter who ran sixty yards through a clear field for a touch-down. Following this M. A. C. quickly acquired the ball kicked to Syracuse, but lost it to Brown who with an interference of half the orange eleven ran forty yards for a third touchdown. The score, 21-7.

Even though the fourth quarter be-gan under a cloud of twenty-one points M. A. C. fought hard for the game. Snider's playing was a feature of this quarter both in stopping Syracuse end runs and line plunges and in carrying

One of the most impressive features of the home-coming program was the unfurling of the service flag between halves at the game. Preliminary to the unfurling a company of girls dressed in white skirts and green sweaters put on a creditable military drill and in their final movement drew up facing the standard. As the flag was dropped they came to a smart salute holding it until the band had finished playing the Star Spangled Banner.

the ball himself. Just before the end of the game he had to be taken out because of injury. The end came after a 50-50 fight in the middle of the field.

Preliminary to the varsity game the all-fresh played the 310th Ambulance Corps from Camp Custer and won in the last quarter by a score of 6-0. About 60 of the ambulance men accompanied the team from Camp Custer and between halves of the varsity game put on a drill around the field. They were followed by the M. A. C. band. A clown "jazz" band also put on several stunts between halves. Just before the beginning of the second half a company of M. A. C. girls in green sweaters and white skirts gave a short exhibition drill which was followed by the unfurling of the new college service flag. This feature was very impressive.

The afternoon play showed that in the making of first downs M. A. C. made it nine times out of eighteen possible chances, while Syracuse made it nine times out of eighteen possible chances. Syracuse made three successful forward passes out of the seven attempts, while M. A. C. succeeded in completing four successful passes out of the possible nine that were attempted. The yards gained through passes by Aggies far exceeded those gained by the Orangemen, Aggies gaining sixty-five and opponents twenty-six yards.

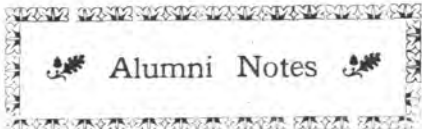
