ANNUAL TRI STATE DEBATE THURSDAY NIGHT.

The local contest of the annual Tri-State Debate in which Purdue, Iowa State and M. A. C. match their argumeteers, takes place in the armory Thursday evening when the M. A. C. team meets the debaters of Iowa State College.

The question debated this year is "Resolved that the U. S. Government Should Take Immediate Steps to Acquire and Operate the Coal Mines as a Permanent Policy."

The affirmative team is made up of S. M. Powell, '20, C. J. McLean, '20, and S. Rabinowitz, '18, while those to uphold the negative against Purdue at Lafayette, Ind., are J. W. Sims, '19, W. E. Fowle, '20, and H. C. Howard, '18. The varsity debaters have been working hard in an effort to win for M. A. C. the honor of taking two tri-state debates in succession and duplicate their victory of last year. The Girls' Glee Club will sing before the debate.

This year's team is made up entirely of green men, every one of last year's winning squads having graduated or entered military service.

C. M. WEED, '83, CALLED TO WASHINGTON.

Clarence M. Weed, '83, a member of the park commission of Lowell, Mass., and head of the nature study department of the normal school there, has just accepted an appointment from the National Bureau of Education for six months' service in Washington on war garden work. His

call to the capital came direct from R. P. Claxton, commissioner of education, who requested Mr. Weed to assist in working out plans for school directed home gardens, and asked that "as a patriotic duty" he come to Washington as soon as he could get there. Mr. Weed is an authority on garden work, an author of many books on gardening and is chairman of the school garden committee of Lowell, Mass.

ABBOT HALL TO REMAIN CLOSED.

Abbot Hall, which at the beginning of the winter term was entirely closed except for Club B, will remain closed during the spring term. The Abbey was closed partly as a fuel conservation measure and partly because of the thinning of the ranks of M. A. C. men to a point where they could be taken care of in Wells and Williams. The number of students leaving during the winter term and those who will undoubtedly be called in the next draft quota will so reduce the number of men in the dormitories at the beginning of the spring term that it is questionable whether both Wells and Williams halls will be reasonably filled.

M. A. C. GIRLS SAVE WHEAT.

Following Dan Reed's lecture at M. A. C. three weeks ago the girls in the Woman's building boarding at Club C voted unanimously to eliminate white bread and butter from their dinner menus henceforth, and accordingly since Feb. 15 no wheat bread and butter have been served in Club C at the evening meal. For Club C, however, no straight wheat breads have been made this term, substitutes having been used in all.

An agitation is being raised by the Holcad and members of the men's clubs on the question of eliminating wheat breads of all description from the club tables and undoubtedly by next term the student body will be doing their full share in saving wheat for the allies.

WRONG TACTICS.

The difficulty between the potato growers and the federal grading regulation which occurred during the meeting of the Potato Growers Association last week undoubtedly brought the college some unfavorable publicity. On many sides there was heard expressed a feeling of shame that M. A. C.'s name should enter the reports of the controversy, even as host of the warring factions. A Michigan farm publication had advised its readers to come "with brickbats" for the potato grading rule. And they came, their pockets bulging with that weapon of the Bolsheviks. Had they come with a spirit of co-operation instead of the "bricks" undoubtedly they would have gained a point. WALTER GORDON, S. C. '13-'15.

News has just been received of the death of Walter Gordon who was a short course student at M. A. C. in the years 1913-14 and 1914-15. Gordon was a member of Co. A, 125th U. S. Inf., and died within the past month at a training camp in New Jersey. He entered M. A. C. from Plymouth, Michigan, his death adding a gold star to the service flag of the Plymouth high school.

The University of Illinois recently unfurled a service flag with 2686 men represented upon it.

TRACTOR SCHOOL BIG SUCCESS.

One hundred and thirty-seven men signed up and attended the first week of the tractor school now being held at the college under the direction of Prof. Musselman, '08, of the farm mechanics department. The course is of a very practical nature, most of the time being spent in work on the tractors. Every man is being given an opportunity to learn the starting and adjustments of gas engines and tractors first hand and each must spend a certain length of time in driving the tractors about the farm, belting them to silage cutters, and other problems in handling. During the two weeks of the course every man will have had an opportunity to operate each of the seven or eight makes of tractors being used in the demonstration.

On Saturday afternoon the entire class went to the Reo Automobile factory in Lansing and were taken through the shops where they observed the processes of automobile and tractor manufacture and were shown the new type of caterpillar tractor which the Reo company have just begun making under government contract.

To relieve the steady grind of work on the machines and on the benches a number of lectures have been interspersed. F. A. Peck of the Vacuum Oil Co., talked on Motor Oils, F. J. Filkins, '12, of the Novo Engine Co. of Lansing, on Problems in the Manufacture of Gas Engines, and E. P. Yerkes of the U. S. Department of Farm Management, spoke on Studies in Tractor Economics. This week Prof. McCuen of Ohio State University is giving some lectures on the design, operation and care of tractors, and tractor plows and hitches.

The Nelson Studios of Detroit have taken a number of moving pictures of the M. A. C. tractor course, which are to be released by the Mutual Co. The course is new in the United States, Ohio State, Indiana and Wisconsin besides M. A. C. being the only ones to give tractor work this year. At the other institutions the courses lasted but one week and were little more than demonstrations.

ALPHA ZETA INITIATES.

Four members of the class of 1919 were taken into the Kedzie Chapter of Alpha Zeta last Thursday evening following the usual confirmatory tests which candidates for membership in that fraternity are subjected to. The men taken were R. N. Wright, W. H. Thies, L. W. Miller and E. D. Yunker. The initiation banquet was served at the Wildwood.

C. F. Murphy, graduate assistant in botany, left East Lansing Feb. 24 to enter military service. He is now a corporal in Recruit Co. C, 4th Training Bn., 155th D. B., Camp Lee, Va.

VARSITY AND FRESH FIVES WIN FINAL GAMES.

In the new gymnasium Saturday night a very triumphal finish to this year's basketball schedule was made when the varsity defeated the Detroit Y. five by a score of 23 to 16 and as a preliminary to the varsity game the all-fresh took a 26-24 battle from Detroit Junior College. In the varsity game Coach Gauthier's men struck a going stride from the beginning, but our forwards were guarded so closely that the score at the close of the first half was but 8 to 4 in our favor. In the second half the play was more to M. A. C.'s liking and when the final whistle blew the markers stood M. A. C. 23, Y 16.

In the junior contest the freshmen were guarded hard during the entire game and had it not been for the strong lead which they were able to pile up in the first half they might have been swamped before the wind-up, for the Detroiters made fourteen points to the freshmen's five in the second half.

FRESHMEN WIN OVER SOPHS IN INDOOR MEET.

The freshmen celebrated the opening of M. A. C.'s new indoor track Friday night by winning over the '20 men in the first indoor meet in the new gymnasium. The final score was 70 to 62 in favor of the freshmen. As may be guessed from the figures the competition was of a nip-and-tuck sort, although the lower classmen managed to keep one or two points ahead most of the time. In the next to the last event, however, the '21 men cinched the meet in the four-man medley relay and completed it in the tug of war which they also took.

A number of new potential track lights showed up in the meet, men who with training will a little later be able to represent M. A. C. in a creditable fashion both in indoor and outdoor track sports.

SPRING TERM ATHLETIC SCHEDULE.

At the March meeting of the Athletic Board of Control the spring term schedule for track and baseball was adopted and recommended to the faculty for acceptance.

Director Brewer will coach the baseball team this spring, thus doing away with the hiring of an outside coach. John Morrissey, a former Central Michigan leaguer has coached the squad in former years. Director Brewer's own ability in this line together with the fact that the baseball season is short, extending in games only from April 13, the opener with Alma, through May 15, with the University of Michigan, has led to the observing of this little economy.

An intercollegiate track meet to be held May 18 is under advisement by a committee of the board. Practically all of the middle western institutions are giving up intercollegiate track meets this year because of the expense involved. It is a question of expense alone that will decide the holding of the usual intercollegiate meet at the college this spring. All Michigan institutions, except the university, have ordinarily taken part in this meet and they are now being corresponded with to see whether they will desire to enter teams if the customary meet is scheduled.

Baseball prospects are very good, although practically all of the material reporting thus far is new. The first training call was issued for March 11 and men have already begun their workouts in the armory.

The customary interscholastic track meet usually staged on College Field in which all the high schools in the state are invited to participate will not be held this spring due to the fact that all high schools have given up spring athletics in favor of the organization of farming squads who will go into the country and assist the farmers during the spring and summer.

OLD TIME ATHLETIC CARNIVAL IN NEW GYM APRIL 6.

An athletic carnival or fair such as used to be held at M. A. C. several years ago is being planned by the athletic board of control to be held in the new gymnasium on the second Saturday in the spring term, April 6. The carnival will follow the lines of those of former years and each of the various organizations in college will be given some particular stunt to develop. Director Brewer has had considerable experience in athletic carnivals and fairs since leaving M. A. C., the last one he held at the University of Missouri netting the athletic department something like \$3,000 from shows and concessions for which not over five cents admission was charged.

The athletic department, however, is not planning the carnival as a money making scheme, but is working to make the affair an "all college" meeting in which everyone will have a part and where the whole college community can come together for a good time. In former years the spring term athletic carnival has been looked forward to from one season to the next and has not only been a means of producing some revenue for the athletic department, but has been one of the big democratic social meetings of the college year when the entire student body and faculty too had some part in putting on the shows and came together for a general good time. Because of inadequate facilities for handling the crowds during the past two or three years the carnival has been dropped. This year with the opportunity offered by the gymnasium it will be possible to have the carnival on a larger scale than ever before and it is the idea of Director Brewer and the athletic board to make this year's event one in which the whole M. A. C. family may get together for a regular old-time jollification.

One of the first signs of spring about the campus is the appearance of the baseball. With tossers in twos and threes it came out last Saturday.

DR. W. F. DURAND ON WAR CONFERENCE IN LONDON.

A recent issue of the government's Official Bulletin announces the appointment of Dr. W. F. Durand, pro-

fessor of mechanical engineering at M. A. C. from 1887 to 1891, as a member of the inter-allied conference on international standards soon to be held in London. This conference is called for the purpose of standardizing manufacturing materials used in production of machinery, motors, air crafts, etc. The American delegation headed by F. G. Duffen of the aircraft board, includes members from all of the prominent engineering societies in the country. No attempt will be made by the conference to standardize airplane construction, but rather those materials and units only, which are at present causing confusion in purchase and delivery and for which suitable standards can be established.

LIEUT. BLAKE MILLER, '16, IN CHARGE CUSTER GARDENING PROJECT.

Lieut. Blake Miller, former M. A. C. football star and at present 1st Lieut. in Co. A, 330th M. G. Bn., has been placed in charge of a camp gardening project for the cantonment at Camp Custer. It is planned to put a considerable area of the Camp Custer reservation, under cultivation this summer and attempt will be made to raise sufficient vegetables and garden truck to supply the camp messes during the summer and fall. Certain plots will be assigned to designated units in the camp and each will look after its own garden plot. At present in preparation for the work Lieut. Miller is engaged in a survey of the reservation with the idea of locating all lands suitable for gardening and farming on the 7,000 acres enclosed in the cantonment site.

I spent about five weeks at a school where I learned all sorts of perfectly horrible and interesting things. The censorship rules forbid of writing much real news but I can

say that one day you might find me crossing the hills with a truck train, another day I may be waving my hands at a Frenchman arranging for billets, straw, etc., for my men and horses. Then it may be necessary to put up several barracks, find wood and water, etc.

I have just finished installing a small electric lighting system for the Y. M. C. A. and our officers. Then the letters home must be censured during your spare time and a hundred other details attended too. We do not have time to get lonesome. The men are a fine bunch. They take hard work and long hard training without a murmur. I am sure proud to be one of them. We have good times also. The Y. M. C. A.'s are doing splendid work. A few evenings ago we had a visit from a band from another organization and they made this little old French village ring with good old U. S. A. music.

We can hear the big guns bark most all the time. Everything seems to be going pretty good. The men each received a nice big box of smokes from you people back in the states and they appreciated it very much.

Some time ago I had the pleasure and opportunity of visiting Paris. I visited the French patent office and also the big building where they keep their models. In this building there is not only a rare collection of models showing a sort of history of French inventions but a great many of the first machines put into actual use. For example, I saw there the first steam engine that ran out of Paris, about 1770. Also the first successful

The following is part of a letter received from Roy E. Decker, '15, by Prof. Hedrick:

I enlisted at Chicago Dec. 8 and was then sent to Jefferson Barracks which is a large receiving and equipping post, 12 miles south of St. Louis. There we received our final exam. and uniform. I was there just 26 days, 18 of which were spent in the armory of the National Guard in St. Louis. The Barracks are prepared to accommodate about seven or eight thousand men but at one time they had over 15,000 there. You can see what that meant. I'll never forget some of my experiences there but will relate those some other time.

Nearly one hundred field artillery men were sent down here on Jan. 6. It took us two days to make the trip coming by the way of the Missouri Pacific. There may be other routes but don't tell Aunt Lou. It was a delightful change in weather between St. Louis and San Antonio. Arriving here they selected thirty of us for the Headquarters company. This Co. does no actual work with the guns but does the scouting, range finding, signal work and mapping for the battalion. The 3rd Field is one of the oldest artillery regiments.

We are quartered six men to a tent. I am with a couple of ex-bank clerks, an ex-school teacher and two book-keepers. Our "grub" is good and we are well-clothed. Our training thus far has been largely mounted drill and signal work. Each man has his own horse and saddle and must take good care of them. Our routine is about as follows: Arise at 6:15; stand reveille at 6:30, breakfast at 7:00, police up our tents until 7:15; groom horses and clean stables to 7:45; three hours of mounted drill; dinner at 12:00; drill on semaphore and international during the afternoon until 4:00. Sometimes we get infantry drill in the afternoon. From 4:00 to 5:00 we can do as we like. Supper at 5:00; retreat at 5:30; lights out at 9:00.

The mounted drill is interesting; most of us had never done a lot of horseback riding and many had never been on a horse. You can imagine what a motley crew we made. We must do hurdling, mount and dismount at a gallop, ride at a gallop with arms folded and without stirrups. It is exciting and good exercise. We sometimes go on long rides into the country, riding through the mesquite, fording streams, and galloping across the open stretches. We have not been issued our pistols and probably will not be until we get into camp some place.

Friday the captain gave us our first exam. in semaphore and I was among twenty of the company who qualified. Those who did not will continue to study until they do qualify, unless their case is hopeless.

I receive the M. A. C. RECORD each week and it is read from cover to

aeroplane and the first Beroit plane to fly across the English channel. This visit was of special interest to me as my work for the last two years previous to entering the service took me into the U. S. patent office a great deal. I expect to return to my work with the General Electric Co. if I get back some day after we have landed the Kaiser's goat.

I suppose if this letter should get into the RECORD my M. A. C. friends would have a good excuse to set down and write me a long letter. I would like to hear from them all very much. A letter from the states is a treat over here and helps one to forget that he is a H—of a ways from home. However, I am glad I am here. Hoping this finds everything fine with you and M. A. C. I remain

cover. There are many of my acquaintances in the service. While in the hospital I met a fellow from Charlotte, Mich., who knew Bottomley very well and showed me a letter from him. I've met several fellows who knew people whom I had met.

San Antonio is a city of about 135,000; the largest city in Texas. There are lots of Mexicans here and a few negroes. The town is wet but there is a city ordinance that no liquor can be taken from the saloons. It is rigidly enforced. This, coupled with the law prohibiting the sale of liquor to soldiers, makes things pretty clean here in that respect. I have yet to see the first drunken soldier here in San Antonio or a soldier who had had any liquor. In St. Louis it was a different story. It is a fine thing that the lid is on so tight here. Fort Sam Houston, Camp Travis and Kelly Field are all within a radius of five miles from the center of town. The fort where the regulars are training is about two miles out and Camp Travis where the drafted men from Oklahoma and Texas are training adjoins the fort. Kelly Field is where the aviation men are training. We see lots of aeroplanes and observation balloons. The other morning 15 aeroplanes passed over the fort. Camp Leon Springs is nearly thirty miles out from here. It is where the batteries and infantry go for target practice. There is also an officers' school there.

Most of the fellows are anxious to pull out of here and make the trip over. We must have more training than we have had, however, and it is rather discouraging at times the way some of the fellows, particularly the older fellows act. We certainly will not and cannot go across until we are better than we are now. I'd like to see the whole show through since we are so near the affair. It would be monotonous to train a whole year in this country.

I must bring this to a close and write more again. The folks are all well at home, and hope you can all say the same.

As the "chow" bell is about ready to go I will say good-bye with love to all.
