Alumni Association Closes Important Year

1Editor's Note—Because of lack of space the special July issue did not carry the annual report of the secretary and the report of the resolutions committee adopted on Alumni Day. These reports are given below.)

R. Bruce McPherson, President, M. S. C. association, Sir:

A FTER more than five years of service to the organized alumni of Michigan State it becomes rather a stereotyped task to make an annual report. The best that can be done is to point out the high spots of the year just closed and make some prophecies for the future. Not always is each detail of a year's program carried out and not always does one feel encouragement in the tangible results of a year's effort. In the field of alumni activity is this particularly true.

Days or weeks of effort often go into some particular problem without the slightest hope that in any public way can the result be demonstrated. The building of a substantial and permanent alumni consciousness is the task of not months but years, and calls for continued persistence, courage, vision, and cooperation on the part of all concerned. I am often impatient at the slowness of progress and setbacks which are, I suppose, the normal obstacles in the way of achievement. As I picture the unlimited opportunities for profound, dignified and helpful service to the College, and realize our own present incapacity as an association to rise to our responsibilities, I try to analyze the situation.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION PERMANENT

Occasionally one hears the old statement that some college presidents would willingly exchange positions with the wardens of state penitentiaries because they would then have no alumni interference or domination. So seldom does the evil ten per cent actually threaten that the malicious picturing of the extreme seems to me to be entirely uncalled for. The answer to the cynic's criticism, the only answer I can give to my own inquiries as to the future, is that alumni organizations are here to stay.

The problem is not whether we shall

have them but how to bring them into their most useful relationship with the College, how to widen the interest among the alumni themselves, how to make better alumni. It is generally conceded among members of our alumni secretaries' council that the most important phase of this problem is that of the student body itself. The active and interested student makes the active and interested alumnus. It is then a responsibility resting jointly on the College and the alumni association. The energy of our own association is being directed to a large extent along these lines. Visitations to dormitories and fraternities, publicity stories and advertising in the undergraduate paper have been inaugurated this year. Whatever can be done to build up a more sympathetic understanding among students as to their future relationship with the alumni association and the College will be work of greatest influence and value for the future.

retired as librarian after more than 40 years of devoted service to the College. In recognition of the important part she played in the lives of hundreds of former students and as an expression of appreciation for her distinguished service the members of the M. S. C. Association extended to her on Alumni Day an honorary life membership in the alumni association.

With the understanding that our association builds its hope, not alone on financial assistance but on a sincere, loyal group of men and women, each one working unselfishly for the common good, we turn to the report.

MEMBERSHIP

IT WAS anticipated that in the hysteria of these times of economic stress that the paid-up membership of the alumni association would drop. We have lost a few for this reason. But the encouraging sign of the year has been the unwillingness of many loyal alumni to allow anything to interfere with the medium connecting them to their college. The officers of the alumni association have asked me to express appreciation to those individuals who have held membership this past year, and to those who have not yet become affiliated I extend a cordial invitation and a sincere plea that you avail yourselves of the opportunity. With a decline in revenue from membership the officers will insist that the alumni program be curtailed and that is something to be deplored because this is the year that the College can use all the assistance possible. We continue to look forward with eager eves to the time when we can build up our annual alumni fund to the status it must occupy if we are to strengthen and expand our organized alumni work.

ALUMNI UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships and loan funds have been badly needed here for worthy students whose matriculation or continuance in college would be greatly handicapped without some outside assistance. Early last year our alumni president, Mr. McPherson, led a study of alumni undergraduate scholarships. By action of the State Board of Agriculture in April approximately thirty-two boys and girls, graduates of high schools of the state of Michigan, will enter the College next fall as the recipients of the first of the M. S. C. alumni undergraduate scholarships. The selection of these students is now in process and the applicant picked following a culling process which considers the qualifications of

hundreds of high school pupils. The scholarships will be distributed equally over the state, one award being made in each senatorial district.

The scholarships amount to a waiver by the College of the term fees or tuition, and have a value of approximately \$100.00 per year. The students are nominated by alumni and school officials from the upper one-fifth of their respective high school classes, and nominations have been confined to those students whose financial circumstances definitely warrant this scholarship aid. After the alumni clubs or committees make their final selections a faculty committee appointed by President Shaw will conduct a comprehensive examination for the applicants. This test will be given on July 30 and is calculated to determine accurately the mental caliber of scholarship win-

The interest of alumni throughout the state in this important alumni project of the year leads me to believe that if the project is continued another year the result will be more applications, enlarged scholarship award committees, and definite and more carefully prepared plans by this network of active alumni in every county of the state of Michigan.

THE ALUMNI CLUBS

No GREAT effort has been expended in the organization of alumni clubs this past year. I have previously expressed the feeling that local clubs, organized by pressure of the general association soon become stagnant. It is my opinion that except for specific purposes the growth of clubs should come slowly and as a result of local alumni desire.

We now have twenty-five regularly organized alumni clubs and I have personally visited eighteen of these groups this year. The past summer a trip through the east provided an excellent opportunity to met our alumni in Toledo, Cleveland, Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Ithaca, New York city, Philadelphia, and Pittsburgh. This summer I expect to direct my attention to visitation of alumni resident centers within the state of Michigan.

The alumni office constantly assists the local clubs-by supplying up-todate lists, sometimes mailing notices, securing speakers, movies, etc.

THE ALUMNI OFFICE

As I stated last year in my report, it is difficult for one to describe the multitudinous activities of our alumni office staff throughout the year. It has always seemed to me that much of the time and labor spent in gathering statistics and other detailed information about the accomplishments of the past might be directed much more pro-

fitably toward the doing of something worthwhile for the future. Lest you think that all we do in the office is smile sweetly into the telephone and take a vacation once a year-I quote from the authentic records of the Union's night commissioner that, during the twelve-month period ending June 1, the alumni office alone mailed out 43,175 letters and cards. In addition we sent out more than 30,000 copies of the alumni magazine, kept up a filing system for more than 7,200 graduates with separate base cards, plates, folders, etc., for each, located several hundred "lost alumni," assisted all local alumni clubs in one or more meetings, supplied hundreds of M. S. C. alumni with information and addresses enabling them to keep up intellectual and social contacts begun during college days, assisted class secretaries with reunion plans and letters, and numerous other groups who carry prestige for the College.

The backbone of our alumni relations is still, and probably always will be. The Record, official alumni magazine. That magazine must continue to speak for itself. It has appeared this year in a new cover, as a symbol of sustained vitality, which has been quite favorably received.

CONCLUSION

CANNOT close a report of this I nature without voicing my appreciation of the work of the other individuals employed in the alumni office. Miss Gladys Franks, '27, as alumni recorder and office manager, handles the office routine in such a way that we have been complimented many times on our efficiency. Our restricted finances have made it necessary to eliminate one stenographer from our corps, and George Culp. of the class of '33, on a part time basis, has proved capable of carrying increased responsibility, decreasing but little the efficiency of the office though it has meant considerable night work for him. In addition I am sure few alumni associations can boast of a more harmonious executive committee than has served your interests this past year. To our retiring president, R. Bruce McPherson, '90, I wish to express my appreciation for his vital interest in the Association for the past two years and to tell him we are glad he is to retain a place on the executive committee.

While the office succeeded in spending all the money that the distracted treasurer could raise, it was expended for needed maintenance and a few improvements already overdue. The Association is only, properly speaking, the instrument, the machinery perhaps, to serve the College and the alumni in whatever manner is most desirable and feasible. The secretary asks only that

the support of the alumni office be sufficient to keep the machinery in good order.

Winding Cedar Comments

M. S. C.'s new horde of freshmen will convene on the Campus this fall, September 21 to 24, for Freshmen Week services, the administration announced recently. They will undergo various tests and orientating procedures before the upperclassmen arrive for actual college classes September 23 and 24,

Impressed by a personally conducted survey as to what State students are reading, Jackson E. Towne, new college librarian, intends to overcome excessive novel reading on the Campus by placing open book shelves in all rooms of the library. State's modern library is built under the "hidden shelf" influence in architecture, and as a result no one but the attendants know what the shelves contain. Mr. Towne hopes to correct this evil by placing in full view the library's store of biography, travelogue, history, and works of a similar serious nature.

Headed by the world famous Will Durant and "Young Bob" LaFollette, six outstanding American lecturers will cross the Liberal Arts lecture platform here next winter. The list includes: Daniel Frohman, stage impressario; LaFollette; Robert Reynolds. prize-winning Harper novelist: Durant; Dr. R. L. Ditman, New York zoologist and reptile authority; the Rt. Hon. H. B. Lees-Smith, British cabinet minister.

Preceded by fifty-seven cavalry officers riding side roads toward Camp Custer, the M. S. C. unit of R. O. T. C. officers left June 16 and 17 for their annual six weeks summer camp training. Eighty-seven students left this post; infantry and cavalry for Camp Custer, and coast artillery for Fort Sheridan, Illinois. Intensive training in all practical problems of military life is required of upperclass cadet officers prior to graduation.

Comparison between the results of Rockefeller Foundation tests given applied science and liberal arts sophomores at Michigan State and all Pennsylvania colleges, revealed that State students are slightly below the Penn average, according to word received by Professor L. C. Emmons, research professor in institutional management. Spartans topped their Penn contemporaries somewhat in English grammer, but fell behind in science and literature. Liberal Arts students in general were higher than their fellow science students in literature and cultural subjects but dropped in scientific fields.

Gifford Patch, '16, and C. R. Oviatt, '16, of the College extension department, appeared before the Federal Farm board in Washington, D. C. during June to negotiate loans which would enable Michigan sugar beet factories to operate during the present season. It is reported that between \$8,000,000 and \$10,000,000 is to be distributed about the state.

Six Spartan athletes went to the Pacific coast late in June for participation in the I. C. A. A. A. A. meet at Berkeley, California. Their expenses were paid by California universities who desired to assure the meet for their section of the country. Roger Keast, sophomore quarter miler; Otto Pongrace, half miler; Ted Bath and Cliff Liberty, ace hurdlers; Art Buss weight specialist, and Ralph Small two miler, went west in private cars accompanied by Ralph H. Young, director of athletics.

Upon the favorable impression created by Sphinx, local women' honorary, on Miss Elsie Murray, national vice-president of Mortar Board depends much of State's chances o gaining a charter from the nationa women's honorary fraternity. Mis-Murray was on the Campus June 7 and 8 to inspect Sphinx for prospective membership.

Depicting "Re-Dreams of Old Rec Cedar," the senior class staged successfully the annual Water Carniva June 11 and 12 on the banks of the Red Cedar before a combined crowd o 5,000 persons. Events in canoe racing and tilting, vaudeville skits and musi cal numbers preceded the traditional procession of floats, this year number ing 33. The entire history of the Col lege was portrayed for the audience many of whom were former graduate back for Alumni Day. Sigma Alpha Epsilon drew first prize for its con ception of M. A. C.'s part in the World War. Kappa Kappa Gamma depicted the founding of the Liberal Arts divi sion successfully to take second honors Trimoira fraternity was awarded thir place for their float representing State's chances at the Olympic game this summer. Clark Chamberlain senior president, and Maxine Sturgeor vice-president reigned over the car nival as King and Queen, from thei elevated thrones above the river. Jame Hasselman, supervisor of publications served as preceptor, while Curne Hampton, of Lansing, was genera chairman.

A novel feature of the afternoon program was a pageant of progress in the field of agriculture, depicting harvesting transportation, and home conveniences.

M. S. C. celebrated two anniversaries this spring. In addition to its own 75th birthday, it joined the city of East Lansing in commemorating the latter's 25th year as an incorporated community. An elaborate pageant depicting East Lansing "Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow" took place in the Peoples church with many students and faculty participating. Local merchants displayed antiques and ancient oddities in their windows for the edification of the townspeople.

How Can it be Done?

TOW can the alumni raise a substantial annual fund for the activities of the association, the n publication of an interesting magazine and help some needy undergraduates without fuss and feathers-without expensive campaign methods? Just glance at the lists published below and the answer to your question will at once be apparent. Without pressure and without class organization 1372 alumni contributed the sum of \$4,221.15. All this was secured without other publicity than an occasional reminder from officers of the alumni association. We asked for but \$2.50, the amount of membership dues, plus any additional amount an alumnus felt he could contribute. The average contribution came to approximately \$3.08.

We can raise a fund comparable to our devotion to the old school in several ways: 1. By increasing the total number of participants in our financial endeavor. Had all classes been organized as was 1895 we could have added at least \$5,000 and reached a grand total of nearly

2. By increasing the average annual gift. Several colleges now use the slogan, "Don't give till it hurts-just give till it helps." We can give an amount annually at least comparable to the aver-

age gift given by alumni of other schools. 3. By having you send your 1932 contribution promptly, thus saving us the expense of sev-

eral notices. Postage is now one of the big items in the Association budget. The Annual Alumni Fund plan, now in use by more than 85 colleges and universities, provides a means for a cash contribution from each alumnus according to his ability each year. The

Alumni Fund does not ask you for a gift as something you owe but rather in the spirit of presenting you an opportunity to do something for Michigan State that will give you satisfaction and at the same time add substantially to the part the alumni play in the role of progress for the College.
