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Dear Ralph,

I was indeed surprised, When I saw - allready in Lansing, of course - that You signed Your cordial dedication with Your First name. This is not usual in Germany, because University Professors befilted like to keep a long distance themselves and their students. That they do not in the States, was one of most appreciable impressions, I got at MSC. The first time, when I observed this relation of convidence and privacy between MSC-instructors and students, was in a little restaurant outside of Lansing. Some Professors of the (Margrimed) Political Sciance Department and a couple of students had together a drink and no stranger would have been able to say who are the one and who the others. -

Beeing back now in Germany, I am busy in studying and collecting all the material, which I got during my trip. It is a big heap. Besides I got about 700 Fotos. Two weeks ago I started my first lecture, concerning general impressions and partly traffic affairs. Especially in traffic matters we learned and saw a lot of importend things. The traffic situatin in America shows - no doubt the situatin, which we have to expect in 20 or 30 Years in Europe. The experiances in other police branches are not so different to those in my country. The main point is in most cases the question of better equipment in the states as a reason of money. I know, most american police experts do not agree with this argument, because they cannot imagine our poorness. But You can probably, When I tell You, that the state police of Bavaria is forced to sell a great number of its trace trained police dogs, because the r is no money to feed them. Belegve ist or not, - it is really true! Or annother problem: If the State police does not get a higher radio etat, it will last about 100 sears to buy radio equipment only for our rural traffic police. In Upper Bavaria they are able to buy one a year ( population: 9 000 000 ).

Of course, besides of those troubles, there are a lot of things we can learn and transfer from America to Bavaria. My lectures -4 furtherware in preparation - will be a good help to instruct the responsible german police authorities.

I am sorry that we had only some few hours to listen to Your instructions. I would have been glad to hear more. Allthough police laboratory sciances are in Germany a job of special/ists who do not belong to the police, it was allways one of my hobbies. Annother hobby was traffic. It must not be longer, because after beeing back I was moved from the detective service to the traffic branch. Now I am in chargie of all traffic affairs in Upper Bavaria.

I add a couple of prints and I hope You and Yours collegues will like to remember our stay when You have a look on it. I myself am not to be seen because I was allways the fotographer.

Please convey my best regards to all the gentlemen I became aQuanted with, especially to Mr. Scott, Miller, Blackford, Wigbee, Leonhard, Munsterberg, Grimes, Mr. and Mrs. Brandstatter and his secretary (I forgot her name).
