DEPARTMENT OF ANTHROPOLOGY

The Undergraduate Major

Introductory Courses: Students who wish to major in the Department of Anthropology should, at the earliest possible time, complete the courses; required/ of overyand Anthropology 100 and 171, and either Sociology 241 or 251. The 9 credits earned in the introductory courses count toward the minimum total of 40 credits in anthropology necessary for the major. (Not more than 70 credits in anthropology are accepted as part of the total required for graduation.) Topical Courses: In order to acquire a minimum competence in some of the major subdivisions of anthropology, a major must earn at least 15 credits from among the following courses: Anthropology 462, 463, 464, 467, 473, 474 and 475. Area Courses: A major in anthropology must have a basic knowledge of at least two areas of the non-Western world. Each student is required to earn 15 credits from among the following courses: Anthropology 275, 281, 390, 391 and 469. Anthropology 469 is the number used to designate eleven different advanced courses dealing with North American Indians, Latin America, Sub-Saharan Africa, Southeast Asia, Japan, China, India and Pakiotan, At least 9 of the required 15 credits must be earned in courses numbered 469.

Other Requirements: In addition to the departmental requirements listed above, the following all-university and College of Social Science requirements are relevant to anthropology majors.

- 1. Complete the four general education courses in the University College, plus three terms of physical education (or sophomore standing).
- College level

 2. Attain first-year competence in a foreign language.

- 3. Complete 9 credits in one of the following: foreign language beyond the first year, mathematics, philosophy, physical or biological science.
- 4. Complete 48 credits in courses numbered 300 and above.
- 5. Complete a total of the credits, with not more than 100 credits in any one college, and not more than 24 credits in technical courses in excess of those required for a major.
- Achieve a minimum grade-point average of 2.0 for the entire program of study.

I ADMISSION QUALIFICATIONS POLICY:

Any person who applies for admission to the graduate program in Anthropology should be considered without regard to the field of his previous academic training. Admission to the graduate program will be limited to those applicants who hold undergraduate degrees and who the admissions committee feel can satisfactorily complete the requirements for a graduate degree in this department.

11. Graduate Curriculum

The purposed statement of graduate curriculum is contained in the attached manual for graduate study. Serious disagreement arose only in regard to the fields of anthropology which are required for the doctoral program. Parker wishes to express his opinion that statistics and research methods should be included in the list of required fields. Although statistics and methods in anthropology is listed as a suggested specialized area, statistics may be eliminated since a student is free to chose any two special areas in this catergory.

PURPOSED MANUAL OF GRADUATE STUDY IN ANTHROPOLOGY AT MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY 1. Statement of Objectives

Anthropology takes man as its central object of study and gives the student a framework for viewing man's place in the natural world; his evolutionary background and development; the organization of social life, cultural and symbolic systems; the evolution of societies, and the interrelations between colors and shared ways of thinking and feeling. Major points of orientation are the search for cultural universals in the midst of wide variation in ways of life; the processes of change and alteration in social and cultural structures; comparisons between different societies and "stages" of development from "primitive" to "civilized"; and the functioning of social institutions as part of overall cultural systems. Anthropology views the world of man's many cultures as a natural laboratory in which diverse historical experiments have occurred and are occurring, the study of which can help in understanding human behavior. Providing a foundation for a broad liberal education, study of anthropology also prepares a student for diverse careers. in education, medicine, government service, and institutions in which knowledge of human relations is important.

II. Core Courses

Every graduate student entering the department of Anthropology, whether he is seeking a Master of Arts or a Doctor of Philosophy degree, must complete the core course program. This series of six courses is designed to eliminate inequalities in the educational background and to provide all students with an introduction to the basic fields of anthropology. The department recomends that the core courses be taken as early as possible in the ecademic program, preferably during the first year of graduate study. Satisfactory preformance in these courses requires their completion with a grade of B or better. No deferred grades will be given in the core course program. Core courses are as follows:

The core course program must be satisfied before the qualifying examination is taken.

(i). Master of Arts Program

A student accepted by the department of anthropology for study toward a M.A. degree is assigned a faculty advisor before the beginning of his acadenic program. By the beginning of the third term of his first year of study the student will select a graduate committee. The M.A. committee includes a chairman, one other member of the anthropology department and a third member who may be from the faculty of another department.

Course Work

45 Credits are needed for completion of the Master's degree: 24 of these credits are required to complete the core course program, 9 credits must be selected from graduate courses offered by the anthropology department and 12 credits may be taken in other departments or applied to thesis research.

Hasters Examination

Upon satisfactory completion of 45 credits of graduate work each student must take an oral master's examination. This examination is given by members of the student's Masters Committee but may include any other member of the anthropology faculty who wishes to examine the candidate. Master's examinations will cover both course work and the candidates thesis, If a thesis is presented. The candidate's degree of proficiency on the Masters examination will indicate one of four final decisions by the faculty of the entire department. These include: 1) Pass -- In which case a Master of Arts degree is awarded. 2) Fail--Indicating that the student may not continue study in the department of anthropology. 3) Terminal Masters Degree-Awarded only after completion of an acceptable Masters thesis and indicating that graduate study may not be continued in this department. 4)Re-examination--in rare cases the faculty will invite a student to retake the Masters examination after a specified period of study.

IV. Bostoral Program

Every student who is accepted for the doctoral program in anthropology is immediately assigned a faculty advisor. At some time during the first year of study the student selects a graduate committee composed of a Chairman, 2 other members of the anthropology faculty and a fourth member who may belong to the faculty of another department.

Gore Courses and Qualifying Examination:
All students seeking a Ph.D are required to satisy the core course requirement. When this requirement is completed the student must take the oral qualifying examination. This examination is given by members of the students committee and other members of the anthropology faculty who wish to attend the examination.

Performance on the qualifying examination will result in one of three final discussions by the departmental faculty: 1) The student may continue study for the Ph.D. 2) The student may not seek a Ph.D. in this department. 3) The qualifying exemination may be retaken after a specified period of further study.

The Comprehensive Examination:

Every candidate for a Ph.D. degree will be required to demonstrate his competince in all of the following fields of anthropology:

1. Archaeology

2. Physical Anthropology

3. Linguistics

4. General World Ethnology

5. Complete knowledge of the ethnology of one major culture area of the world, i.e., Africa, the Near East, Inner Asia, the Far East, Oceania Morth America or Letin America.

Candidates must also demonstrate a detailed knowledge of at least two other specific areas of anthropology. The following are suggested but students may substitute a wide range of areas in this category with approval of his graduate committee:

1. Linguistics

2. Physical Anthropology

3. Statistics and Methods in Anthropology

4. Personality and Culture

Applied Anthropology
 Language and Culture

Competence in the fields of anthropology and the two speciality areas will be exaluated by written and oral comprehensive examinations. The comprehensive examinations will be given by the graduate committee at any time the student feels prepared to take it. The candidate's performance on the comprehensive examination is reviewed by the entire faculty which decides if the examination has been passed, failed or may be rotaken. In some cases the graduate committee may recommend additional course work before re-examination. In no case will the comprehensive examination be given before at least one of the foreign languages has been passed.

Departmental standards follow those outlined in the Bulletin on Graduate Study. No foreign language is required for the Master's degree, but the department strongly recommends that Master candidates who intend to pursue the Ph.D pass one foreign language before taking the Masters examination. Students working toward a Ph.D. must 1) have a reading knowledge of French and German 2) may on consent of his graduate committee substitute another foreign language for either French or German 3) must have a reading knowledge of one foreign language and a language substitute. Rules governing language substitutes are fully explained in the Bulletin on Graduate Study. The anthropology department requires that one language be passed before the candidate takes the comprehensivesive examinations and that both

languages be completed before the dissertation defense.

Fleldwork

All Doctoral candidates are required to engage in some anthropological field work. This work must be carried on in a culture which differs from ones own. The period of time the student spends in the field is up to the discretion of the graduate committee. Comprehensive examinations must be completed before the student undertakes his field work requirement.

Dissertation

Before a candidate can be awarded a Ph.D. degree, he must present a dissertation to his his graduate committee and successfully defend his dissectation at a scheduled thesis defense. The thesis defense will be conducted by the candidate's graduate committee and other members of the departmental faculty who wish to attend.

Other Requirements

In addition to Departmental requirements all graduate students must meet certain requirements of the Graduate School of Social Sciences. These requirements will not be specified here but should be consulted under the headings of transfer credits, time limit, requirements for the degree, acadimic standards, and residence rules in the Social Science section of the current Issue of the Michigan State University Catalog.

Minutes of Staff Meeting Department of Anthropology December 21, 1964 Present:

1. Graduate Student Admissions

Admission to Graduate School for Miss Joan Baisly and Miss Lundstrom was discussed at length. Jack Donoghue moved that both students be given provisional admission. This motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

2. MacDonald Case

Chairman Hughes reported to the staff the action taken by the Dean's committee against John MacDonald, a student in the Department of Anthropology, for his admitted act of plagiarism. According to Hughes, the above mentioned committee voted 3 to 1 (C. Hughes dissenting) to suspend Mr. MacDonald for a year. His case would again be reviewed at the end of the year provided that during that time he "undergo intensive psychiatric treatment".

Related to this, it was unanimously agreed that Professor Hughes write a letter to Miss Anne tibbitts (whose paper Mr. MacDonald used verbatim) warning her about <u>lending papers</u> in the future. It was to be understood that the Staff is not categoridally opposed to such student interaction, but that it feels very strongly that students lending papers to others have the responsibility to follow up whatever use is made of them.

3. Al Hudson offer.

The question of whether or not to extend an invitation to Mr. Al Hudson to join our staffw as also discussed at length. It was decided that a decision now would not be advisable since there was really very lettle information on the man. Messers Gallin and Parker suggested that Hughes call Bob Smith at Cornell for an overall evaluation is quite positive it was decided that Hughes should then immediately extend the invitation to Mr. Hudson. The details of the offer would then be worked out by the faculty advisory committee. If Smith's evaluation was doubtful, it would then be discussed in more detail by the advisory committee.

The above suggestion was facorable to everyone present and Hughes made plans to make the call to Bob Smith the following day (Tuesday, December 22).

4. Election of the Advisory Committee

It was decided to elect the Chairman's advisory committee at this meeting. The only voting staff member absent was Charles Cleland. The committee is to be composed of three staff members; two at the

associate professor level and one at the assistant professor level. The balloting resulted in the election of B. Gallin (at the assistant professor level), M. Swartz (at the associate professor level) and a tie between Daris Swindler and Seymour Parker as the second Associate professor. A telephone call to Charles Cleland would be made the next day by Charles Hughes to get his vote and break the tie.

5. Date for Comprehensive examinations forthe Ph.D.

It was unanimously decided that the date for the Comprehensive should not be rigidly set, but rather worked out in particular case by the student's committee. However, for purposes of the graduate student manual, this qualification should read that Comprehensive examinations should "normally be taken in January".

- 1. Disposition of students making below B work in Anthropology.

 Mr. Gordian Armstrong -- letter of regisration circulated and accepted.

 Miss Joyce Neimi -- concensus is she is not to continue in Department.

 A letter was written to her to this effect.

 Miss Marylin Vogt -- letter B, strong, was to be sent.

 Mr. Winn Smith -- candidacy of his Ph.D. degree was discussed.

 Concensus was it would not be advisable to continue on for Ph.D. It was left for his committee to decide whether a M.A. degree could be conferred with a possibility of a thesis on paper presented.
- 2. Coffee hour:
 John Donoghue reported that arrangments are underway for a coffee hour
 for undergraduates and all interested students for the 8th April, 4:00
 International Center--Room 106.
- 3. Dean McQuitty's request for the offering of small classes for undergraduate majors in anthropology. It was decided that anthropology 474 (Ec. Anp) and 475 (Pol. Anp) should be desnigated as such courses. That is, enroll in these courses limited in anthropology undergraduates or permission of instructor.
- 4. Harry Raulte:
 Chairman Hughes reported that interested persons, i.e. -- Dean Hunt, of the Medical College, were impressed with Raulet as a potential member of both Anthropology and the College of Human Medicine. It was suggested by Seymour Parker that before an offer is made to Harry Raulet, that Professor Hughes confere with Dean McQuitty and Dean Hunt to clarify the following what would happen if Raulet is given tenure in anthropology and the Medical School should, for some reason, decide to discontinue appropritation of funds for Raulet's salary. Professor Hughes agreed to confer with Dean Hunt and McQuitty on said issue.
- Ottenberg: Professor Hughes communiated to staff, Mr. Ottenbergs' decision desire to postphone a decision on invation to join Anthropology's staff until approximately the middle of May.
- 6. Relations with Sociology—Professor Nicholas reported on his confrontation with John Useem concerning Mary Jane Beeches degree plan. More specifly, Nicholas took it upon himself to change the nature of her degree from a Soc-Anp Interdisciplinary Ph.D. to a Ph.D in Sociology, with a minor in Anthropology.

 According to Nicholas Useem verbally re-acted to this action, claiming it was not Nicholas's position to change the nature of degree, furthermore, the Inter-disciplinary degree is still a integal part of Sociology, and that furthmore, despite anthroplogy disincalation to continue with an Inter-Dis. degree, Mrs. M.J. Beech would never the less, qualify for such a degree under current comments to continue such a program of such individuals who were M enrolled in the joint department. It was agree that Professor Useem's point with respect to Mary Jane Beech be

accepted, however, the staff urged Dr. Hughes to make it clear to Useem and to Dean McQuitty, that such a degree, i.e., can not continue to be a degree, granted at the sole disquistion of Soci@logy. Furthermore, the Department of Anthropology feels that such a program for the Ph.D., is at this point unfeasible.

- b. As a result of the above and other confrantations with Sociology a proposal was submitted by S. Paker for the possibility of an M.A. degree in Social Science, This degree would consits of courses in Anthropology and Sociology plus geniune Inter-Displinary for linking courses. According to Mr. Parker this proposal should be submitted to Useem and McQuitty as Anthropology alternative to Useem's insistance on an Inter-Disp. program. The staff, tentatively agreed to this plan and it was suggested that Professor Parker draw up a more detailed and specific plan. Dr. Parker agreed.
- c. Professor Gallin told staff the request of Professor McKee, that Ruth Useem be given permission to teach a "Special Course" to education majors under the title--Culture Personality, in the Spring of 1966--the staff, unaminously agreed that under <u>no</u> circustances, could this be possible.
- d. Professor Gallin tentatively reported on progress in the arrangments of the Fall teaching schedule. Due to certain, uncertanties, a final schedule will not be available until mid-april or there abouts.

Miscellanous:

Professor Hughes reported briefly on the progress of the NSF higher education Proposal -- known to him as the "Great Leap Forward" plan. Finally Professor Hughes reported to the Staff the results of his conversation with Gar Wood, concerning the possibilities of research funds for Joseph Spielberg--Dr. Wood is seemingly favorable to sponsering same.

- 1. NDEA Proposal: A tentative NDEA proposal was passed around. Charles Hughes requested assistance to draft final proposal—Swartz volunteered. It was noted that Latin America as a area of comptence was excluded. Dr. Hughes explained that exclusion was due to lack of facilities to teach Portaguse on campus. Spielberg suggested that Spanish America be included thereby passing language dificincy noted above. Dr. Hughes agreed to consider it.
- 2. Graduate Program Revision. Charles Hughes passed out copies of the tenative graduate program recently revised. He requested that staff members look it over for future staff meeting.
- A copy of proposed changes in University tenure rules was circulted-All staff members present went on record as being against such changes.
- 4. Raulet--Leighton
 Charles Hughes informed the staff that an offer had been made to

 Hughes also informed us that Mrs. Leighton had apparently received
 an offer from North Carolina and was considering it. According to

- 5. MARZOCO-- Dr. Hughes communacted the general details of the meeting with one Mr. Marzoco. Mr. Marzoco is a physocologist currently heading a higher learing research project in the department of education. His conversation with Dr. Hughes dealt with possibilities of inter-relations between his project and the Department of A nthropology. Among these possibilities were the availiability of graduate student assistanships for anthropology students interested in problems of education. Another such possibility was that of a inter-departmental appointment for one Mrs. Grinager--Mrs Grinager, a women with extensive training in Anthropology and specificaly proplems of education an learning--Staff members agreed that Dr. Hughes should look further into Mr. Morozaco's tentative proposation. NDEA Fellowship and Assistanships: Professor G llin communiated to the staff that a NDEA Fellowship had been offered to a Miss Albers, who has accepted for next fall . He also informed the staff members to communate to him names of graduate students to whom an NDEA fellowship may be offered. CLASS HOUR CHANGE: A notice of changes in beginning times for classes for next fall was circulated--Beginning next fall there will be a 20 minute intival

between classes.

Dr. Hughes announced at next weeks staf meeting the Anthropology Club will have Lester Evans as Speaker.

MEMORANDUM

Re: Examinations for graduate students in Anthropology

I have been rather concerned about both our qualifying and our comprehensive examinations and would like to call to your attention some suggestions that I would like to make for changing the way we are administering these. I am sending a memo because this matter may come up for attention while I am in Africa.

I think that both of these examinations should be given no more than three times a year. They should be based largely, or even entirely, on a common written performance. Especially the Master's qualifying ought to be a written examination. I think the questions should be composed by the entire Department and graded by the various men who specialize in the field covered by the particular questions rather than by the committee guiding the student. It seems to me very important that the grading of these written examinations (if they are used) be "blind." That is, that the students names not be allowed to appear on the exams so that we can evaluate them without the complications that arise from our attachments and disaffections interfering with our judgement. This is what they do at Chicago and at Harvard and I think there is a great deal to recommend it.

The sheer bulk of students that we are handling now and will be handling in the future may necessitate an approach of this sort, but I think on grounds other than expediency it is one that is worth considering. This sort of an examination would allow us to set definite cut off points for pass, fail with reexamination, and fail without opportunity for reexamination. The maintenance of high standards in the Department depends upon our using a rigorous and objective examination procedure and it seems to me that this can only be done with a written instrument.
