Report of Examination of Sample of Hair

On Sunday, February 1, 1948, I received from Mr. Leonarde Keeler a sample of hair with the request to examine it carefully to see whether or not it was possible to tell whether it had been pulled out of the scalp.

EXAMINATION: The sample submitted consisted of approximately 300 strands of hair, ranging in length from one and one-half inches to five inches. The hair was light yellow and of a silky quality. The diameters of several strands were measured and found to approximate .003 inches in diameter. The medullary pigmentation was of an intermittent type and light in color, as is found in blond hair. About one-third of the sample was selected at random and each end of these hairs carefully examined under a microscope, using a slide and cover glass. The short hairs were all found to have broken or cut ends, but on ten strands of hair, all of which were long, were found the dried remains of root bulbs. The findings were so definite that it did not seem feasible to examine the other 200 hairs in the sample.

CONCLUSIONS: In the portion of the hair examined, there was definite evidence that the hair had been pulled out of the scalp.
