sessions, the automotive program, junior and senior demonstrations, public speaking, Passport to the World sessions, and many other interesting features listed in the program. The day will be climaxed with banquets for District Award winners and 4-H Clover Award Leaders prior to the evening program in the University Auditorium.

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 28, 1963 <u>4-H PARENTS - A GENUINE SALUTE</u>. Today's program is dedicated to all parents whose loyalty and encouragement serve to make 4-H the important educational program that it is today. Without the guidance, interest and individual concern

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of parents, this State 4-H Club Show would not be possible. Highlights of today's program include the rifle shoot, Club meeting demonstration, entomology program, special evaluation sessions, tractor operators, tours, horse show, chicken barbecue, and the evening program in the University Auditorium.

OUTDOOR MEALS PROJECT FEATURES NEW APPROACH TO EDUCATION SESSION -- A complete chicken barbecue with all the trimin's will be in store for outdoor meal delegates and their guests today. Scheduled for 9:00 a.m. at 150 Brody, registered members only, will learn the fine points of preparing a chicken barbeque for large groups. Charles Sheppard, Extension Poultry Specialist, and Mrs. Mildred Jones, Assistant Manager of MSU Resident Halls, will conduct the training session that will climax with an actual B-B-Q on the lawn in front of Brody Hall. This is one of the first "learn by doing" educational sessions staged at State Show, but plans are to include many more of this type in future Shows.

<u>GIRL MEETS BOY-TODAY</u>....This program shapes up to be as interesting as the title suggests. Dr. Eugene Peisner will explain dating customs in other countries, then he will compare these with our own. You'll be able to see the "reasons why" our dating patterns have developed as they have...as well as some of our beliefs about dating. Teenagers and parents won't want to miss this special session at 10:00 a.m., Room 31, Union (see bus schedule).

DOG PROGRAM....About 20 dogs, ranging from a 100 pound St. Bernard to a one pound Chihuhua, are on exhibit in Demonstration Hall. This is the first year for this 4-H project to have more than one county with exhibits at State Show. Officials and members themselves are both helping with judging. Wednesday's Dog Program will be at 3:30 p.m. on the Parade Field near Dem Hall.

DRESSING BY DESIGN....This fall it's the "sportive look" that counts, and teenagers will hear all about it at 2:00 p.m. in the Union Ballroom. The "sportive look" will be found this fall in textured stockings, the suede vest, bulky wool turtle necks, dickeys, knit gloves and short pigskin gloves according to Miss Margaret Reed, Clothing Specialist, who will be in charge of this session. Girls can make their clothing accessories work for them by careful planning and "dressing by design." Color, texture and shape of accessories are all a part of appearing harmonious. The "Dressing by Design" session should be especially interesting in these "back to school" days.
