PITCHING

PROSPECTS FOR 1975

State's 1975 team should have better hitting, fielding and pitching than last year's, says Head Coach Danny Litwhiler, and hence produce an improved over-all record and a stronger performance in the Big Ten.

The 1974 club achieved a 23-16-1 card in all games and 7-8 in the Big Ten, good for sixth place. Only two regulars are gone from that team, outfielder Bill Simpson, who also was an All-America defensive back in football and now plays for the Los Angeles Rams, and pitcher Steve VanderLaan. Simpson batted .328 in his senior season and VanderLaan posted a 2-3 won-lost mark on the mound.

That means the current Spartan team will be loaded with veterans who should show improvement through additional maturity and experience.

A rundown by positions:

Pitching -- Rick Moore, 7-1 and a second team All-Big Ten choice last season, George Mahan (3-3), Duane Bickel (4-2 despite an arm injury), Jim Kniivila (4-3) and Scott Evans (3-1) will form the nucleus. Others expected to contribute materially include junior Moe Danielewicz and sophomores Todd Hubert and John Lincoln.

Catching -- A very strong position with both Dale Frietch (.425 and All-Big Ten first team and third team All-America last year as a designated hitter) and Rick Seid (.308) in action again. The one which isn't catching may be the designated hitter for the game.

Infield -- Likely starters are three regulars from last season and either of two newcomers at third base. The veterans are first baseman Howard Schryer (.271), second baseman Craig Gerard (.194) and shortstop Terry Hop (.299). The fresh faces at third are sophomore Randy Pruitt, kid brother of recent Spartan star Ron Pruitt who now is a catcher with the Texas Rangers, and Pat Simpson, younger brother of Bill Simpson. Ready for utility work will be Joe Palamara and converted pitcher Don Ballard.

Outfield -- All-Big Ten outfielder Al Weston (.288 and six homers in 1974) is a fixture in right. Converted first baseman Mike Fricke (.343) will go in center and converted third baseman Amos Hewitt (.307 and five homers) will work in left. Likely backup men are veteran Dave Collison (.222) and newcomer Tyrone Willingham, a junior better known as a quarterback on the football team, who is making his first try at baseball.

PLAYER SKETCHES

- DONALD BALLARD Infielder -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Senior -- Lansing. Begins final year of competition with the Spartans. Shifted to infield to take advantage of his strong bat. Will be available for spot mound duty. Appeared in eight games last spring as pitcher. Two-time All-City selection as prepster. Cousin of Spartan stars and later major leaguers Dean and Bruce Look. Agriculture and natural resources major. Born 2-15-53.
- DUANE BICKEL Pitcher -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Senior -- Muskegon (Orchard View). Spartans' top hurler in 1974 until a sore arm sidelined him. Pitched well over the summer and seems to be ready for regular duty. Registered a 4-2 record in seven starts. ERA of 1.71 was best among regulars. Possesses a live fastball and a sharp curveball. One of MSU's best fielding pitchers. Health, physical education and recreation major. Born 12-20-52.

- DAVE COLLISON Outfielder -- Throws Left -- Bats Left -- Senior -- Saginaw (Carrollton). Available for utility work in outfield. Spartans' No. 1 pinchhitter from left side. Should perform better in 1975. Nicknamed "Collision." Made All-Conference and All-State. Health, physical education and recreation major with specialty in youth leadership. Born 10-19-54.
- MOE DANIELEWICZ Pitcher -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Junior -- Hamtramck (St. Ladislaus). Sat out most of 1974 campaign because of injury. Has looked impressive in indoor practice. Good fastball and curve. Only thing he lacks is experience. Was prep team's MVP. Brother Mike worked with Spartan football squad while brother Mark was a member of MSU baseball team. Health, physical education and recreation major. Born 7-7-54.
- SCOTT EVANS Pitcher -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Junior -- Northville (Northville). One of MSU's strongest pitchers. Has excellent shot at being fourth man in pitching rotation. Appeared in 11 games last season, five as a starter, and wound up with 3-1 mark. Won eight letters at Northville High. Agriculture and natural resources major. Born 5-3-54.
- MIKE FRICKE Outfield -- Throws Left -- Bats Left -- Junior -- Grosse Pte. Woods (Bishop Gallagher). The early season choice for the starting job in center field. Will replace Bill Simpson. Can move to first base if needed. Moved up from JV's last year and batted .343 in 24 games. An excellent gloveman, he fielded 30 balls without an error. Liberal arts major. Born 8-13-54.
- DALE FRIETCH (as in itch) Catcher/Designated Hitter -- Throws Right -- Bats Right Senior -- Cincinnati, Ohio (Purcell). Was a third-team All-America selection last year after powdering opposing pitching for a .425 batting average. Also an All-Big Ten pick as a designated hitter. Chosen as MSU's Most Improved Player in 1974. His .425 average was sixth best in Spartan record book. Will again share designated hitter and catching duties with Rick Seid. Has improved his throwing arm since last spring. Twice baseball MVP at Purcell High. Mathematics and statistics major. Academic All-America selection. Born 10-24-53.
- CRAIG GERARD Infielder -- Throws Right -- Switch Hitter -- Senior -- Grand Blanc (Grand Blanc). Holds starting job at second base for MSU in 1975. As good a gloveman as any in the Big Ten. Has had hitting problems in the past. Learned to bunt over the summer and with his speed, he should be able to get on base with consistency. Social science major. Born 9-15-53.
- AMOS HEWITT Outfielder -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Senior -- San Francisco, Calif. (Kennedy). Figures to make debut in left field in 1975. Operation on arm prompted switch to outfield from his regular third base spot. Could end up as Spartans' designated hitter. Career batting average hovers near .300 mark. Hit five homers last season to rank second on team in that department. Brother Anthony was member of Spartan grid team. Urban and metropolitan studies major. Born 12-25-52.
- TERRY HOP Infielder -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Junior -- Zeeland (Zeeland). Rated by Spartan coaching staff as one of the best shortstops in MSU history. Hit for a solid .299 average and led the team in triples (6). Tied for the team leadership in total bases (65). Best hit and run man on squad. Transfered to MSU from Grand Rapids Junior College. Pitched in high school and won All-League and All-District honors. Health, physical education and recreation major. Born 2-9-54.

- TODD HUBERT Pitcher -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Sophomore -- Harper Woods (Bishop Gallagher). Will likely land a job in bullpen or as spot starter. Came down with stiff arm after relieving two games in 1974, got back into action and then was struck by a batted ball in practice. Has looked impressive in indoor workouts. Possesses the best curveball on the Spartan staff. An Honor Society member in high school. Pre-veterinary major. Born 7-18-55.
- JIM KNIIVILA Pitcher -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Sophomore -- Holt (Holt). Registered 4-3 mark in eight appearances last year. Injured his throwing arm at tail-end of last season and will have to work his way back onto starting staff. Tossed three shutouts as a freshman. All-State and All-America at Holt High School. Nickname is "Evil." Won nine letters as prepster. Liberal arts major. Born 3-31-55.
- JOHN LINCOLN Pitcher -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Sophomore -- Portage (Northern). One of three newcomers to make the spring trip to Florida. Available for spot mound duty. Main weakness is his inexperience. Dad was a member of Chicago White Sox organization. Lettered in baseball and basketball in high school. A member of the National Honor Society. An accounting major. Born 3-25-55.
- GEORGE MAHAN Pitcher -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Junior -- Davison (Davison). Will probably break into Spartans' starting four. Finished up as MSU's top pitcher last year. Chalked up a 3-3 record in 1974, including one shutout. Fastest thrower on Spartan staff. Transfered to State from Genesee Community College. Member of National Honor Society in high school. Health, physical education and recreation major. Born 6-9-54.
- RICK MOORE Pitcher -- Throws Left -- Bats Right -- Sophomore -+ Midland (Midland) Selected to All-Big Ten team as a freshman. Hurled his way to an impressive 7-1 record in 12 appearances. Has a good variety of pitches including an excellent change of pace. An imposing figure on the mound, he stands 6-6 and weighs in at 232. Runs into control problems at times. Made All-Conference and All-State teams as prep pitcher. Liberal arts major. Born 2-9-55.
- JOE PALAMARA Infielder -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Senior -- Wyandotte (Roosevelt). Most valuable utility player on Spartan squad. Can play anywhere in infield or outfield. His good speed makes him a prime candidate for pinchrunning duties. A smart player, he mans the first base coaching lines when not in the game. Nephew of the late Frank Palamara, one-time Spartan baseball captain and director of MSU's Ralph Young Scholarship Fund. Played on Trenton American Legion state championship team. Hotel and restaurant management major. Born 9-26-53.
- RANDY PRUITT Infielder -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Sophomore -- Flint (Central). Figures to be leading candidate for regular third base job. Sidelined last season by academic problems. Has good all-round talent, and hits with power. Brother of ex-Spartan star Ron Pruitt, now a member of the Texas Rangers. Made All-Conference and All-State teams in high school. Liberal arts major. Born 2-25-55.
- HOWARD SCHRYER Infielder -- Throws Left -- Bats Left -- Senior -- Plymouth (Plymouth). Returns to handle first base duties. Has been hampered by broken finger in early practice, but should recover in time for start of regular season. Expected to have a fine year at the plate for the Spartans. Hammered opposing pitching for a .323 average as a sophomore, but slipped to .273 last season. Despite mediocre average, he led the team in doubles (11) and was second in RBI's (29). Tied a Big Ten mark last season against Northwestern (May 19) when he drove in eight runs in one game. Advertising major. Born 11-14-53.

- RICK SEID Catcher/Designated Hitter -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Senior -- Oak Park (Oak Park). Will alternate with Dale Frietch between catcher and designated hitter. Made great debut as Spartan, batting .308 in his initial season. Ranked high in most of the hitting categories. Tied for team leadership in hits (44), second in doubles (10) and fourth in total bases (60). Transferred to MSU from Michigan where he lettered as a freshman. Has exceptional arm. Won eight letters in three sports as prep player. Made All-League, All-Metro and was drafted by Red Sox. Radio-TV major. Born 7-10-53.
- PAT SIMPSON Infielder -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Sophomore -- Royal Oak (Shrine). Joins varsity squad from Spartan JV team. Brother Bill was All-America football star at MSU and won MVP honors in 1974 with baseball team. Another brother, Gary, is a member of the University of Detroit baseball club. Agriculture and natural resources major. Born 2-22-55.
- BILL ST. CLAIR Pitcher -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Sophomore -- Springfield, Mass. (Tech). Recovering from arm injury incurred last season. May see early action with Spartan junior varsity club. Came to MSU with All-State and All-New England prep credentials. Possesses a lot of poise for a youngster. Drafted by Red Sox, but opted for college career. Health, physical education and recreation major. Born 5-14-55.
- AL WESTON Outfielder -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Sophomore -- Hazel Park (Hazel Park). Returns to claim starting job in right field. A first-team selection on All-Big Ten squad as freshman. Led Spartans in homers (6) and RBI's (31). Ranked second in total bases (62), third in stolen bases (6) and fourth in hits (40). Expected to raise his .288 batting average during his sophomore campaign. As a prepster, he made All-State teams in both baseball and football. Was member of the National Honor Society and won the American Legion Award for his school. Hotel, restaurant and institutional management major. Born 8-4-55.
- TYRONE WILLINGHAM Outfielder -- Throws Right -- Bats Right -- Junior -- Jacksonville, N.C. (Jacksonville). Begins his first season with MSU baseball team. A two-time letterwinner on MSU football squad, he's the Spartans' second-string quarterback behind Charlie Baggett. Will be a valuable addition as reserve outfielder. Has excellent speed, strong arm and is a good defensive player. His absence from the game has hurt his hitting. Could see bulk of action as designated runner or as pinch hitter. Agriculture and natural resources major. Born 12-30-53.

DANIEL W. LITWHILER -- Head Coach

Daniel W. Litwhiler, former major league baseball star, has coached the diamond sport at Michigan State University for 11 seasons.

He moved in as head coach of the Spartans in the fall of 1963 and in 11 full years his clubs have played 458 games, winning 294, losing 157 and tying seven for a fine winning percentage of .649.

His 1974 outfit won 23, lost 16 and tied one, and finished sixth in Big Ten standings with a 7-8 mark. One of his best units was the 1971 varsity that won 36 games, most ever for a State nine, losing only 10 and took MSU's second Big Ten team title in history.

All but one of his Michigan State teams have posted winning records in overall play and only one has ever finished out of the conference first division.

The head coaching position at State is the second in collegiate ranks for Litwhiler, who previously was at the helm of Florida State teams for nine years.

His Florida State teams won 189 games and lost 81. His teams had no losing seasons and played in seven district playoffs and three college world series.

Danny's complete college coaching records for 20 seasons show 483 victories, 238 losses and seven ties for an excellent winning percentage of .668.

Six of his Florida State players achieved All-America selection and many went on to professional ball.

Fifteen of Litwhiler's players at Michigan State have earned first-team Big Ten selection, one has made the All-America first team and two the second team picked by the collegiate coaches. Four Spartans coached by Danny have made The Sporting News All-America and two have been All-America Academic first-team picks.

Several of his performers have reached major league ranks, including Florida Staters Dick Howser (New York Yankees), Woody Woodward (Cincinnati Reds) and Ken Suarez (Cleveland Indians), and Spartans Bruce Look (New York Yankees), Steve Garvey (Los Angeles Dodgers), Dick Billings (Texas Rangers), Mel Behney (Cincinnati Reds), Rick Miller (Boston Red Sox) and Rob Ellis (Milwaukee Brewers).

Litwhiler, a 1939 graduate of Bloomsburg, Pa. State College, spent 12 years as a player in the majors before stepping down in 1951. During that time he played with the Philadelphia Phillies, St. Louis Cardinals, the old Boston Braves, and the Cincinnati Reds. Dan was with the Cardinals in the 1943 and 1944 World Series, and played in the 1942 All-Star game.

He managed in professional ball for five seasons. He was playing manager of Fargo, N.D., in 1952, at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., in 1953, and at Jamestown, N.Y., and Duluth, Minn., in 1954. From there he joined the Florida State staff.

Among his memorable performances is his string of 21 straight games in which he hit safely in his first season in the majors. In 1941 he belted a home run in every National League park.

Litwhiler was a perfectionist in the field. He became the first major leaguer to play an entire season without making an error. That was in 1942 when he handled 317 chances in 151 games.

DANIEL W. LITWHILER -- Head Coach (Continued)

Over a period of two seasons he set a record of playing 187 consecutive games without an error. This feat put Litwhiler's glove in baseball's Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y.

His best full season at bat came in 1941 when he hit .305. He had a life-time average of .282.

Litwhiler is known for several innovations in coaching, such as unbreakable mirror for pitchers to use for checking their throwing, and employment of a bat sawed in half to teach bunting. He's also constantly seeking to improve the attractiveness of the home baseball games and the last three years has had batgirls working at home contests.

Litwhiler has contributed to several baseball publications. They include "Fundamentals of Baseball" by University Press, 1956; "Baseball Glossary" in English, Dutch, Italian and Spanish, by University Press, 1958; "Baseball Coaches Guide to Drills and Skills" by Prentice-Hall, 1963; and "Baseball" by Prentice-Hall, 1967.

His alma mater honored him in 1973 by naming its new baseball stadium in his name. Danny also received a special honor last summer from his home area in the state of Pennsylvania. He was inducted into the Jerry Wolman Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in Shennandoah. The chapter, named after the one-time owner of the Philadelphia Eagles, since 1963 has cited men and women in athletics who by distinguished performance have brought honor to that part of the state.

Danny was born August 31, 1916, at Ringtown, Pa. He was married in 1971 to Patricia Walsh James and the couple has ten children. Mrs. Litwhiler received her B.S. and M.A. degrees from Michigan State. Two of their children, Marcia and Dick, graduated from MSU and another daughter, Nancy is in her senior year at State.

Son Dick was a pitcher on the Spartan varsity nine years ago. He received his M.A. degree in physical education and now teaches in that field and is assistant baseball coach at Georgia Southwestern. Son Danny teaches math and is assistant baseball coach at the Air Force Academy.

FRANK PELLERIN -- Assistant Coach

Continuing a longtime association with Michigan State baseball is Frank E. Pellerin, member of Spartan teams as an undergraduate, and a staff member for the 22nd season.

He was appointed as assistant coach in 1953, working with the late John H. Kobs, and the same assignment was extended in 1963 with present head man Danny Litwhiler.

During Pellerin's tenure, Spartan baseballers have played more than 700 games (782 games, 490 wins, 281 losses and 11 ties), won two Big Ten team titles (in 1954 and in 1971) and placed second three times. He's helped coach the Spartans in 21 of their 24 Big Ten seasons and has had a hand in the development of 31 athletes who've earned All-Big Ten first-team selection.

FRANK PELLERIN -- Assistant Coach (Continued)

Pellerin played under Kobs at State, earning varsity letters in 1941, 1942 and 1943 with stints at second base and at third base. He enrolled at State after graduation from Redford High School in Detroit where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball.

His first teaching and coaching position was at Highland Park, Mich., High School, where he remained until joining the Michigan State staff in September, 1953.

While at Highland Park, Pellerin was head baseball coach, assisted in swimming, football, basketball and physical education classes, and also taught classes in mathematics.

Pellerin received the master's degree in counseling and guidance in 1951 at Wayne State University. He and wife, Nancy, have two sons, Michael and Tim.

TOM SMITH -- Freshman Coach

In his eighth season as freshman baseball coach at Michigan State is Thomas W. Smith, who was appointed to the post in September of 1967.

He had served unofficially in the capacity the previous four years while working towards his B.S. degree. In the years that he's handled the Spartan young players, the MSU varsity has recorded an impressive 198-98-5 won-lost-tied mark.

Smith enrolled at State as an undergraduate after playing in professional baseball from 1961 to 1963 with the Milwaukee Braves organization. He was a catcher. He went with the Braves following high school graduation.

Tom is a native of Coldwater, Mich., born Dec. 9, 1942. He graduated from Coldwater High School in 1961 and immediately signed his professional contract.

He received his B.S. degree in physical education in March, 1967 and his master's degree in March of 1971.

In addition to his coaching duties, Smith teaches in physical education. He and wife, Jane Marie, have two daughters, Jamie and Julie.

1976 PROSPECTS

Despite the loss of nine important players from last season's strong team, Michigan State baseball coach Danny Litwhiler terms himself "loaded with optimism about the 1976 club."

"We have a good chance to be a Big Ten title contender again," he says. "We should be improved in almost every department of play."

The 1975 club was beset by such horrible weather, including a flood, that it was on its home John Kobs Field just four practice days and five playing dates. Thirty-five out of 44 games were played on the road, yet the Spartans wound up with a 28-16 won-lost card and came within a whisker of winning the Big Ten championship. It stayed in winning range until the final game of the season and ended with an 11-4 league record and 4th place.

Major losses include the club's top hitter and All-Big Ten and All-America second baseman Joe Palamara who hit .342 last season, first baseman Howard Schryer (.276), catcher Dale Frietch (.175), outfielder Amos Hewitt (.246) and pitchers Duane Bickel (5-2) and George Mahan (6-4). The latter signed a professional contract.

A rundown by positions:

<u>Pitching</u> -- This should be a strong area with five veterans sharing leadership. They are Todd Hubert (6-1 last season), Jim Kniivila (5-3), Rick Moore (3-4), Scott Evans (3-1) and John Lincoln (0-0). Several newcomers figure to make major contributions, headed by sophomore Chuck Baker and freshman John Boland. Both could be regular starters before the season is far advanced. Other new hurlers who may see important action are j.c. transfers Sherman Johnson and Tom Wilson, freshman Gary Tyler and sophomores Larry Pashnick and Don Beck. Another veteran who may be heard from later is junior Bill St. Clair, a victim of misfortunes all through his MSU career. Most recently he broke a leg jumping over a bank of snow and ice.

<u>Catching</u> -- Rick Seid is the man to beat out for the backstopping post. He played in 43 of MSU's 44 games last spring, batted .288 and knocked in 21 runs. His main competition figures to come from either Bob DelPapa, a chunky 5-8 freshman who has picked up the nickname "Road Block", and junior Tony Wenson. Other receivers who could cut in are junior Joe Bakunas and freshmen Mike Moore and Ron Woodward.

<u>Infield</u> -- Three veteran performers and a freshman are likely first string performers here. Randy Pruitt (.270) will be back at third again although he may be called on at times to switch to first. Mike Fricke (.333) probably will be at first most of the time but may also work in center field. Former shortstop Terry Hop (.329) will switch to second. Freshman Roger Bastien, whom Head Coach Danny Litwhiler says is ahead of any shortstop he has ever had at this stage of his career, is expected to be a fixture there. What Danny says is quite a mouthful inasmuch as he tutored a pair of major league shortstops, Woody Woodward and Dick Howser, in their college careers at Florida State. Bastien and Hop could be the most potent double play combination in Spartan history. A pair of freshmen walkons named Martin Maupin and Mark Sutherland have shown considerable promise and could become the key relief men. Outfield -- Three veterans and a sophomore are best bets here. Al Weston (.261), will move from right to left field this spring and Pat Simpson (.311), who was mainly an infield utility player last spring, figures to go to right. When Fricke is working at first base, either varsity returnee Tyrone Willingham (.286) or sophomore Dan Wedley may be in center. Others in the picture for outfield play are sophomore Jerry Weller and freshmen Otha Porter and Dave Conklin.

DANNY LITWHILER Head Coach

Daniel W. Litwhiler, former major league baseball star, has coached the diamond sport at Michigan State University for 12 seasons.

He moved in as head coach of the Spartans in the fall of 1963 and in 12 full years his clubs have played 502 games, winning 322, losing 173 and tying seven for a fine winning percentage of .648.

His 1975 outfit won 28, lost 16 and finished fourth in Big Ten standings with an 11-4 mark. One of his best units was the 1971 varsity that won 36 games, most ever for a State nine, losing only ten and took MSU's second Big Ten team title in history.

All but one of his Michigan State teams have posted winning records in overall play and only one has ever finished out of the conference first division.

The head coaching position at State is the second in collegiate ranks for Litwhiler, who previously was at the helm of Florida State teams for nine years.

His Florida State teams won 189 games and lost 81. His teams had no losing seasons and played in seven district playoffs and three college world series.

Danny's complete college coaching records for 21 seasons shows 511 victories, 254 losses and seven ties for an excellent winning percentage of .666.

Six of his Florida State players achieved All-America selection and many went on to professional ball.

Seventeen of Litwhiler's players at Michigan State have earned first-team Big Ten selection, two (Rob Ellis and Ron Pruitt) have made the All-America first team and three (John Biedenbach, Steve Garvey and Joe Palamara) the second team picked by the collegiate coaches. Five Spartans coach by Danny have made The Sporting News All-America (Garvey, Rick Miller, Ellis, Pruitt and Harry Kendrick) and two have been All-America Academic first-team (Jerry Sachmann and Dale Frietch).

Many of his performers have reached major league ranks, including Florida Staters Dick Howser (New York Yankees), Woody Woodward (Cincinnati Reds) and Ken Suarez (Cleveland Indians), and Spartans Bruce Look (New York Yankees), Steve Garvey (Los Angeles Dodgers), Dick Billings (St. Louis Cardinals), Mel Behney (Cincinnati Reds), Rick Miller (Boston Red Sox), Rob Ellis (Milwaukee Brewers), Ron Pruitt (Cleveland Indians) and Rick Kreuger (Boston Red Sox).

Litwhiler, a 1939 graduate of Bloomsburg, Pa. State College, spent 12 years as a player in the majors before stepping down in 1951. During that time he played with the Philadelphia Phillies, St. Louis Cardinals, the old Boston Braves, and the Cincinnati Reds. Dan was with the Cardinals in the 1943 and 1944 World Series, and played in the 1942 All-Star game.

He managed in professional ball for five seasons. He was playing manager of Fargo, N.D. in 1952, at Wilkes-Barre, Pa. in 1953, and at Jamestown, N.Y. and Duluth, Minn. in 1954. From there he joined the Florida State staff.

Among his memorable performances is his string of 21 straight games in which he hit safely in his first season in the majors. In 1941 he belted a home run in every National League park.

Litwhiler was a perfectionist in the field. He became the first major leaguer to play an entire season without making an error. That was in 1942 when he handled 317 chances in 151 games.

Over a period of two seasons he set a record of playing 187 consecutive games without an error. This feat put Litwhiler's glove in baseball's Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y.

His best full season at bat came in 1941 when he hit .305. He had a life-time average of .282.

Litwhiler is known for several innovations in coaching, such as an unbreakable mirror for pitchers to use for checking their throwing, and employment of a bat sawed in half to teach bunting. Recently, Litwhiler came up with the idea of using a radar gun to chart the velocity of pitches. The clever use of the device has brought interested responses from many major league teams. He's also constantly seeking to improve the attractiveness of the home baseball games and the last three years has had batgirls working at home contests.

Litwhiler has contributed to several baseball publications. They include "Fundamentals of Baseball" by University Press, 1956; "Baseball Glossary" in English, Dutch, Italian and Spanish, by University Press, 1958; "Baseball Coaches Guide to Drills and Skills," by Prentice-Hall, 1963, and "Baseball," by Prentice-Hall, 1967.

His alma mater honored him in 1973 by naming its new baseball stadium in his name. Danny also received a special honor last summer from his home area in the state of Pennsylvania. He was inducted into the Jerry Wolman Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in Shennandoah. The chapter, named after the one-time owner of the Philadelphia Eagles, since 1963 has cited men and women in athletics who by distinguished performance have brought honor to that part of the state.

Danny was born August 31, 1961, at Ringtown, Pa. He was married in 1971 to Patricia Walsh James and the couple has ten children. Mrs. Litwhiler received her B.S. and M.A. degrees from Michigan State. Three children, Marcia, Dick and Nancy have graduated from MSU.

Son Dick was a pitcher on the Spartan varsity ten years ago. He received his M.A. degree in physical education and now teaches in that field and is assistant baseball coach at Georgia Southwestern. Son Danny teaches math and is assistant baseball coach at the Air Force Academy.

FRANK PELLERIN Assistant Coach

Continuing a longtime association with Michigan State baseball is Frank E. Pellerin, member of Spartan teams as an undergraduate, and a staff member for the 23rd season.

He was appointed as assistant coach in 1953, working with the late John H. Kobs, and the same assignment was extended in 1963 with present head man Danny Litwhiler.

During Pellerin's tenure, Spartan baseballers have played more than 800 games (826 games, 518 wins, 297 losses and 11 ties), won two Big Ten team titles (in 1954 and in 1971) and placed second three times. He's helped coach the Spartans in 22 of their 25 Big Ten seasons and has had a hand in the development of 32 athletes who've earned All-Big Ten first-team selection.

Pellerin played under Kobs at State, earning varsity letters in 1941, 1942 and 1943 with stints at second base and at third base. He enrolled at State after graduation from Redford High School in Detroit where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball.

His first teaching and coaching position was at Highland Park, Mich., High School, where he remained until joining the Michigan State staff in September, 1953.

While at Highland Park, Pellerin was head baseball coach, assisted in swimming, football, basketball and physical education classes, and also taught classes in mathematics. 1 25 S. I.

Pellerin received the master's degree in counseling and guidance in 1951 at Wayne State University. He and wife, Nancy, have two sons, Michael and Tim.

1977 PROSPECTS

Armed with more hitting power, an improved defense and a veteran pitching staff, Michigan State enters the 1977 baseball wars with optimism.

Coach Danny Litwhiler begins his 14th season with the Spartans looking to better last year's 15-23-1 record, only the school's second losing campaign in 20 years. However, MSU was in the Big Ten race until the final game and completed play in 4th place with a 7-5 mark. Litwhiler sees State "making things interesting" in the Big Ten again in 1977.

A group of 16 experienced players return to the diamond for MSU. But five valuable people graduated, including All-Big Ten catcher Rick Seid, second baseman Terry Hop, and first sacker Mike Fricke. Filling the receiving post could be a problem, but Litwhiler feels infield replacements are available.

A rundown by positions:

Pitching

The Spartan pitching staff returns intact this spring with a few additions. Mainstays of last year's hill group, righthander Chuck Baker and lefty Sherman Johnson, have looked good in practice. Baker, one of the Big Ten's strongest hurlers in 1976 with a 2.02 ERA, and 2-2 record, experienced some arm problems early this year but the junior should be ready. Johnson posted a 5-4 mark a year ago and threw a fine game against Michigan late in the campaign. Coaches see him as potentially the team's best pitcher. Veterans Todd Hubert, Jim Kniivila, and John Lincoln all look stronger this spring and seem to be throwing harder. A spot reliever last year, Larry Pashnick could see some starting roles. Newcomers Jim Cotter, Dave Guy and Brian Wolcott have been impressive and could gain important spots on the staff.

Catching

With Rick Seid out of the picture, MSU must rely on inexperienced personnel behind the plate. But the catching candidates own strong credentials. Lettermen Joe Bakunas and Tony Wenson have had limited playing time but are improved over last year. Wenson is the most powerful hitter on the squad. Livonia freshman Jerry Pollard could find himself starting this year for State. He is an avid competitor and handles himself well under the mask.

Infield

Litwhiler is proposing some changes this year after the departure of Hop and Fricke from the right side. Senior Randy Pruitt, a third baseman last season, will get first call at first base. Replacing Terry Hop at second may be his brother, Randy Hop. The coaches think the younger Hop can become a better hitter than Terry. Returning at shortstop is standout sophomore Rodger Bastien, a .270 hitter in 1976. Bastien played in all 39 Spartan games last spring, his first at MSU. Third base probably will be manned by one of two first-year varsity players, juniors Cliff Northey and Tony Spada. Northey was a JV performer last season, while Spada is a transfer student from Mott Community College in Flint.

Outfield

Litwhiler calls this the best outfield at State since his arrival in 1963. Both hitting and defense of the Spartan outfield are rated very good. Leading the group is All-America and All-Big Ten selection Al Weston in left field. Al, a senior from Hazel Park, hit .450 in conference play and just missed taking last year's loop batting crown. Weston will serve as MSU's co-captain along with centerfielder Ty Willingham. Ty batted .308 a year ago and was voted second team All-Big Ten. The third member of the regular trio will be Pat Simpson, a .311 hitter in 1976. Junior Jerry Weller, a hitting hero from last spring, could play some outfield, but may show up in the designated hitter slot. Another possibility for outfield or DH play is Ypsilanti sophomore Ken Robinson. Also a Spartan football quarterback, Ken is an excellent hitter with a fine swing.

CHUCK BAKER -- 6-0, 175, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Saginaw (Arthur Hill). One of State's best hurlers last season. Threw two shutouts and won four of nine starts. His 2.02 Big Ten earned run average was among the conference's finest. Experienced some arm problems early in practice. Seems to be back in form now. Possesses a fine variety of pitches. An All-Valley pick at Arthur Hill. Nickname is Buddy. Born 3-13-56 in Tacoma, Wash. Majors in parks and recreation resources.

- JOE BAKUNAS -- 5-11, 185, Sr., Catcher (throws right, bats right), Linden, N.J. (Linden). A prime candidate for the starting catcher role. Good defensive receiver. Handles pitchers well. Picked up five hits in eight games last year, including two doubles. If hitting continues to improve he could be MSU's top catcher. Lettered in baseball and basketball at Linden. Born 8-7-55. A health, physical education and recreation major.
- RODGER BASTIEN -- 6-0, 175, So., Shortstop (throws right, bats right), Grandville (Grandville). Good bet for post-season honors. Coach Litwhiler already feels he is one of the finest players in MSU history. An excellent fielder. Hitting is constantly improving. Batted .270 last spring while playing in all 39 Spartan games. Coaches cannot say enough about Bastien's potential at State. An All-Conference selection in both baseball and basketball while at Grandville High. Served as captain and gained MVP honors with the cage team. Born 3-22-57. An English major.
- DON BECK -- 6-0, 180, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Portage (Northern). Should play a strong relief role for the Spartans. Owns excellent control. Walked an average of one man per game last season. Seemed to gain more control as the 1976 campaign rolled on. Has improved his slider and curve. Attended high school with MSU pitcher John Lincoln. Lettered twice in baseball and three times in football at Portage Northern. Born 12-28-56. Majors in general business and pre-law and hopes to enter law school after graduation.
- JOHN BOLAND -- 6-3, 225, So., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Northville (Northville). Started three games for MSU last spring and completed the year with an 0-2 record. Showed improvement in early practice. Will probably begin the new season in the bullpen. Took four baseball and basketball letters at Northville, in addition to one football monogram. Selected all-league and all-area as a prep. Born 2-6-57. A mechanical engineering major.

- JIM COTTER -- 6-1, 205, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Pewamo (Pewamo-Westphalia). A strong new face on the Spartan pitching scene. A transfer from Lansing Community College. Earned 12 letters while a high school performer, including four in baseball and basketball, one in football, one in track, and two in cross country. An all-area and all-conference selection in baseball. Born 10-14-56. Majors in elementary education.
- DAVE GUY -- 5-11, 170, So., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Grandville (Grandville). Fine newcomer with good control and an exceptional curve. Coaches saw improvement from fall practice to pre-season practice. Attended the same high school as Spartan shortstop Rodger Bastien. Picked up all-conference honors twice and was selected second team All-State. Born 11-23-56. Has not designated academic field.
- RANDY HOP -- 5-10, 165, So., Second Base (throws right, bats right), Zeeland (Zeeland). Takes over the second base slot from his brother Terry, who graduated last spring. Coaches already feel Randy may be a better hitter than his brother. Has power and hits well to all fields. Transfered from Grand Rapids Junior College just as Terry did. An all-conference and MVP pick at Zeeland High. Born 4-25-57. Currently a no-preference student.
- TODD HUBERT -- 6-2, 175, Sr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Harper Woods (Bishop Gallagher). Earned second MSU varsity letter last spring, but failed to win a game in eight appearances. Coaches look for considerable improvement this season. Seems to have regained some of the control he lost in 1976. Hubert led State in 1975 with six wins in seven decisions. Can be effective as a starter or in relief role. Born 7-18-55. A pre-veterinary major.
- SHERM JOHNSON -- 6-1, 195, Sr., Pitcher (throws left, bats right), Grand Rapids (Union). After a strong pre-season showing, the coaches list Sherm as the team's best pitcher. Won five of nine decisions last year. His finest performance came in the next to last contest with Michigan; a 10-2 Spartan victory at Kobs. Led MSU in strikeouts with 36 on the season. State's only top-flight lefthander on the pitching staff. Transferred from Grand Rapids J.C. two years ago. Won three baseball and two basketball letters at Union High. Born 12-27-54. A packaging major.
- JIM KNIIVILA -- 6-3, 195, Sr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Holt (Holt). Had a rough year last spring, winning just once in six starts. Posted five victories for MSU in 1975. Coaches say he's working harder than ever this spring. His control seems to be returning. Certainly has the potential to be a great pitcher for the Spartans. A two-year captain of the baseball team at Holt High. Selected to All-America, All-State and all-league teams.
- JOHN LINCOLN -- 6-2, 178, Sr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Portage (Northern). Put together State's best ERA last year of 1.92 in seven games. All his appearances were in relief. Could see some starting action this season, but he'll probably see primarily relief work. Throwing harder in preseason. Earned two baseball and two basketball letters at Northern. A National Honor Society member. Father played some in the Chicago White Sox organization. Born 3-25-55. A general business major.
- CLIFF NORTHEY -- 5-11, 190, Jr., Infielder (throws right, bats right), Troy (Troy). Possible starting third baseman for the Spartans. Looking strong this spring after injuring his back last year. A regular performer with the MSU JV squad during the past two seasons. Consistent fielder with a potent bat. An allleague pick as a third baseman at Troy High. Also an Honor Society member at the school. Born 2-27-56. Currently majoring in chemical engineering.

- LARRY PASHNICK -- 6-2, 190, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Wyandotte (Rossevelt). Came on strong last season to collect a 2-0 record in two starts. Lettered in basketball and golf, in addition to baseball at Roosevelt High. An all-league and all-district pick. Born 4-25-56. Has not selected selected academic field.

Must battle veterans Joe Bakunas and Tony Wenson for the top slot in the lineup. Owns a powerful swing and should produce a few homers this spring. An outstanding baseball and football star for Franklin High. Earned all-league, all-district and honorable mention All-State in both sports. Born 1-26-58. Majors in accounting.
- RANDY PRUITT -- 6-0, 185, Sr., Infielder (throws right, bats right), Flint (Central). Will take another shot at first base this season. Started there last year, but moved back to his natural position at third. Has fine hands and could probably handle any of the infield positions. Played in all but one game last season for State, hitting .276. Connected for four doubles and three home runs. Always among the team leaders in doubles. Awarded six letters at Flint Central, three for baseball. Selected to All-State, all-valley and allcity teams. Brother Ron, a former Spartan, is a professional player. Born 2-25-55. Majoring in health, physical education and recreation.
- DAVE RADKE -- 5-11, 180, Jr., Infielder (throws right, bats right), Lansing (Sexton). Could play important relief role in the infield. An MSU JV performer during the past two seasons. Strongest position is shortstop. Good defensive range. Slugged a grand slam during MSU's Texas trip. Appeared in one varsity game last year in the outfield. Earned three baseball and three football letters at Sexton High. An All-City, all-district, all-region, and allleague pick as a gridder. Selected as one of the top ten scholastic athletes at State during the past two years. Born 12-2-55 in Lakewood, Ohio. Majors in mechanical engineering.
- KEN ROBINSON -- 6-2, 188, So., Outfielder (throws right, bats left), Ypsilanti (Ypsilanti). A fine new prospect for the Spartan baseball team. Possesses an excellent swing and tremendous power at the plate. Should see plenty of action as the designated hitter. A quarterback with the MSU football squad. Threw one TD pass last fall. Picked up nine letters as an athlete at Ypsilanti. An All-State selection in baseball and football and earned MVP honor with grid and basketball teams. A three-time all-league performer on the diamond. Father played minor league pro baseball with the Chicago Cubs. Born 1-6-57. Currently a no-preference student at State.
 - PAT SIMPSON -- 6-1, 198, Sr., Outfielder (throws right, bats right), Royal Oak (Shrine). A starting member of State's fine outfield lineup. Has hit .311 in each of his first two years with the Spartans. Slugged four doubles and three triples last spring. Finished as MSU's third leading hitter in 1976. An All-State, all-league, and all-area pick at Shrine High School. Brother Bill starred in baseball and football at State and is now a member of the Los Angeles Rams. Born 11-22-55. A health, physical education and recreation major.
 - TONY SPADA -- 5-9, 175, Jr., Infielder (throws right, bats right), Sterling Heights (Sterling Heights). Has a good shot at the third base slot for MSU. Neck and neck with Cliff Northey as the season starts. Played third during high school where he garnered all-league, all-county, and all-area honors. Picked up two years of experience at Mott Community College. While at Mott he was selected to All-State, all-league and all-regional teams. Born 6-6-56. Majoring in business administration. (more)

- MARK SUTHERLAND -- 6-0, 165, So., Infielder (throws right, bats right), Garden City (West). Another fine infield prospect for State. Coaches say he is the most improved player on the squad. Played with the junior varsity team last spring. Good defensive technique with a potentially strong bat. Served as captain of the Garden City West baseball team. Also picked up all-league and NVP honors. Born 9-15-57. Majoring in business accounting.
- JERRY WELLER -- 6-2, 180, Jr., Outfielder (throws right, bats right), Rochester (Adams). Should hit a lot of home runs for the Spartans. Slugged four last season, all in clusters. Seems to be back in the swing this spring. Completed 1976 with State's best batting average, .348 in 23 at bats. Will probably be seen as the designated hitter most of the time. Played shortstop at Adams High and received All-State, all-league, all-district and MVP honors. Born 1-12-56. Has not decided on academic field.
- TONY MENSON -- 6-1, 195, Sr., Catcher (throws right, bats right), Farmington (Farmington). A strong possibility for the catching spot vacated by the graduated Rick Seid. Has most experience of any of the candidates. Played in 15 games last season and hit .231, including one homer. Should hit more HRs this spring. Coaches call him the most powerful hitter on the squad. An all-league and all-district pick at Farmington. A Hillsdale College transfer. Born 9-25-54. Majors in package engineering.
- AL WESTON -- 5-9, 173, Sr., Outfielder (throws right, bats right), Hazel Park (Hazel Park). Co-captain of the 1977 Spartans. Team MVP last season after batting .345. Led State in hits (48), home runs (5), and total bases (75). Also slammed six doubles and three triples during the campaign. Took first team All-Big Ten merits after finishing second in conference hitting with a .450 average. Also named to the all-conference team in his freshman year. A three letter star in both baseball and football at Hazel Park High. An All-State, all-league, and all-district pick in both sports. Born 8-4-55. Majoring in agriculture.
- TYRONE WILLINGHAM -- 5-8, 160, Sr., Outfielder (throws right, bats right), Jacksonville, N.C. (Jacksonville). Enjoyed his finest season on the diamond last spring. Named to the All-Big Ten second team after hitting .387 in league play. Hit .308 during the regular season for the Spartans. Popped six doubles and one triple. Selected as co-captain for the 1977 MSU squad. An excellent clutch player. Completed a fine career with the Spartan football team last fall, earning his third letter. Looking for a third letter in baseball this spring. Received eight letters while at Jacksonville High and was named MVP on the baseball, football and basketball squads. Born 12-30-53. A health, physical education and recreation major.
- BRIAN MOLCOTT -- 6-0, 165, Fr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Plymouth (Salem). One of State's best new pitching prospects. Fired a 16-0 season last spring as a senior at Salem High. A first team All-State selection. Also took all-league and all-area honors. As a basketball guard, he was named to the all-suburban first team. Also received the school's outstanding athlete award. Fine poise and control for a freshman. Didn't allow a hit during last fall's MSU practices. Expected to play a large role in the State pitching staff. Can also be used in a hitting role as he can be dangerous at the plate. Born 2-12-58. Majoring in health, physical education and recreation.

Daniel W. Litwhiler, former major league baseball star, has coached the diamond sport at Michigan State University for 13 seasons.

He moved in as head coach of the Spartans in the fall of 1963 and in 13 full years his clubs have played 541 games, winning 337, losing 196 and tying eight, for a fine winning percentage of .630.

His 1976 outfit won 15, lost 23 and finished fourth in Big Ten standings with a 7-5 mark. One of his best units was the 1971 varsity that won 36 games, most ever for a State nine, losing only ten and took MSU's second Big Ten team title in history.

All but two of his Michigan State teams have posted winning records in overall play and only one has ever finished out of the conference first division.

The head coaching position at State is the second in collegiate ranks for Litwhiler, who previously was at the helm of Florida State teams for nine years. His Florida State teams won 189 games and lost 81. His teams had no losing seasons and played in seven district playoffs and three college world series.

Danny's complete college coaching records for 22 seasons shows 526 victories, 277 losses and eight ties for an excellent winning percentage of .654.

Six of his Florida State players achieved All-America selection and many went on to professional ball.

Eighteen of Litwhiler's players at Michigan State have earned first-team Big Ten selection, two (Rob Ellis and Ron Pruitt) have made the All-America first team and three (John Biedenbach, Steve Garvey and Joe Palamara) the second team picked by the collegiate coaches. Five Spartans coached by Danny have made The Sporting News All-America (Steve Garvey, Rick Miller, Rob Ellis, Ron Pruitt and Harry Kendrick) and two have been All-America Academic first-team (Jerry Sachmann and Dale Frietch).

Many of his performers have reached major league ranks, including Florida Staters Dick Howser (New York Yankees), Woody Woodward (Cincinnati Reds) and Ken Suarez (Cleveland Indians), and Spartans Bruce Look (New York Yankees), Steve Garvey (Los Angeles Dodgers), Dick Billings (St. Louis Cardinals), Mel Behney (Cincinnati Reds), Rick Miller (Boston Red Sox), Rob Ellis (Milwaukee Brewers), Ron Pruitt (Cleveland Indians) and Rick Kreuger (Boston Red Sox).

Litwhiler, a 1939 graduate of Bloomsburg, Pa. State College, spent 12 years as a player in the majors before stepping down in 1951. During that time he played with the Philadelphia Phillies, St. Louis Cardinals, the old Boston Braves and the Cincinnati Reds. Dan was with the Cardinals in the 1943 and 1944 World Series, and played in the 1942 All-Star game.

He managed in professional ball for five seasons. He was playing-manager of Fargo, N.D. in 1952, at Wilkes-Barre, Pa. in 1953 and at Jamestown, N.Y. and Duluth, Minn. in 1954. From there he joined the Florida State staff.

Among his memorable performances is his string of 21 straight games in which he hit safely in his first season in the majors. In 1941 he belted a home run in every National League park.

DANNY LITWHILER, Cont'd.

Litwhiler was a perfectionist in the field. He became the first major leaguer to play an entire season without making an error. That was in 1942 when he handled 317 chances in 151 games.

Over a period of two seasons he set a record of playing 187 consecutive games without an error. This feat put Litwhiler's glove in baseball's Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y.

His best full season at bat came in 1941 when he hit .305. He had a life-time average of .282.

Litwhiler is known for several innovations in coaching, such as an unbreakable mirror for pitchers to use for checking their throwing, and employment of a bat sawed in half to teach bunting. Recently, Litwhiler came up with the idea of using a radar gun to chart the velocity of pitches. The clever use of the device has brought interested responses from many major league teams. He's also constantly seeking to improve the attractiveness of the home baseball games and the last four years has had batgirls working at home contests.

Litwhiler has contributed to several baseball publications. They include "Fundamentals of Baseball" by University Press, 1956; "Baseball Glossary" in English, Dutch, Italian and Spanish, by University Press, 1958; "Baseball Coaches Guide to Drills and Skills," by Prentice-Hall, 1963, and "Baseball" by Prentice-Hall, 1967.

His alma mater honored him in 1973 by naming its new baseball stadium in his name. Danny also received a special honor several summers ago from his home area in the State of Pennsylvania. He was inducted into the Jerry Wolman Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in Shennandoah. The chapter, named after the one-time owner of the Philadelphia Eagles, since 1963 has cited men and women in the field of athletics who by distinguished performance have brought honor to that part of the state.

Danny was born August 31, 1916, at Ringtown, Pa. He was married in 1971 to Patricia Walsh James and the couple has ten children. Mrs. Litwhiler received her B.S. and M.A. degrees from Michigan State. Three children, Marcia, Dick and Nancy have graduated from MSU.

Son Dick was a pitcher on the Spartan varsity ten years ago. He received his M.A. degree in physical education and now teaches in that field and is assistant baseball coach at Georgia Southwestern. Son Danny teaches math and is assistant baseball coach at the Air Force Academy.

Continuing a longtime association with Michigan State baseball is Frank E. Pellerin, member of Spartan teams as an undergraduate, and a staff member for the 23rd season.

He was appointed as assistant coach in 1953, working with the late John H. Kobs, and the same assignment was extended in 1963 with present head man Danny Litwhiler.

During Pellerin's tenure, Spartan baseballers have played more than 800 games (865 games, 533 wins, 320 losses and 12 ties), won two Big Ten team titles (in 1954 and in 1971) and placed second three times. He's helped coach the Spartans in 23 of their 26 Big Ten seasons and has had a hand in the development of 33 athletes who've earned All-Big Ten first-team selection.

Pellerin played under Kobs at State, earning varsity letters in 1941, 1942 and 1943 with stints at second base and at third base. He enrolled at State after graduation from Redford High School in Detroit where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball.

His first teaching and coaching position was at Highland Park, Mich. High School, where he remained until joining the Michigan State staff in September, 1953.

While at Highland Park, Pellerin was head baseball coach, assisted in swimming, football, basketball and physical education classes, and also taught classes in mathematics.

Pellerin received the master's degree in counseling and guidance in 1951 at Wayne State University. He and wife, Nancy, have two sons, Michael and Tim.

TOM SMITH Freshman Coach

In his eighth season as freshman baseball coach at Michigan State is Thomas W. Smith, who was appointed to the post in September of 1967.

He had served unofficially in the capacity the previous four years while working towards his B.S. degree. In the years that he's handled the Spartan young players, the MSU varsity has recorded an impressive 241-137-6 won-losttied mark.

SPRING TRAINING TRIP Edinburg, Texas

Michigan State's hopes for an improved varsity baseball team, one which could be a Big Ten title contender, were buoyed by spring training trip results.

Coach Danny Litwhiler's Spartans produced an 8-7 won-lost record against strong competition. All games were played in the fine baseball stadium at Pan American University, Edinburg, Texas.

Host Pan American beat State in five of six games, but the Spartans topped all other opponents 7-2.

Strong hitting was produced in many games, including frequent long balls. Among the Spartans' 105 hits in the 15 games were 34 extra base knocks. Good depth was demonstrated by the fact that two almost completely separate units were fielded in doubleheaders. The "B" unit acquitted itself well. Several pitchers showed well, indicating improvement in this department.

Only the Spartan defense was disappointing, despite the fact it produced some brilliant plays at times. It also was guilty of 42 errors, almost three per game. Several contests were lost on unearned runs.

Outstanding individuals were numerous, but tops had to be outfielder Kirk Gibson. Playing college baseball for the first time as a junior, this star wide receiver on the Spartan football team was nothing short of sensational. He led the team in hitting with a .486 average on 18 safeties in 37 at bats, in runs batted in with ten and in total bases with 28. He also smashed two tape measure home runs, stole five bases in as many attempts and covered acres of ground in the outfield.

Other potent batsmen were third baseman Tony Spada at .444, second baseman Randy Hop at .370 and outfielder Tom Schultz at .353.

Six pitchers shared the eight winning decisions. Freshman Mark Pomorski and sophomore Brian Wolcott each won twice. Sophomore Eric Rosekrans had no decision but gave up zero earned runs in 7 1/3 innings. Soph Jay Strother's e.r.a. was a nifty 1.92 in building a 1-1 record. Senior Chuck Baker was 1-1 with a 3.11 e.r.a.

Four Spartans were named to the Citrus All-Star Team, a tournament in which the team finished second to Pan American. They were Gibson (also named co-winner of the MVP award with Pan Am's Bobby Rutledge), Hop, Spada and freshman catcher Mark Russ.

Daniel N. Litwhiler, former major league baseball star, has coached the diamond sport at Michigan State University for 14 seasons.

He moved in as head coach of the Spartans in the fall of 1963 and in 14 full years his clubs have played 595 games, winning 365, losing 212 and tying eight, for a fine winning percentage of .620.

His 1977 outfit won 28, lost 26 and tied for fourth in Big Ten standings with a 10-8 mark. One of his best units was the 1971 varsity that won 36 games, most ever for a State nine, losing only ten and took MSU's second Big Ten team title in history.

All but two of his Michigan State teams have posted winning records in overall play and only one has ever finished out of the conference first division.

The head coaching position at State is the second in collegiate ranks for Litwhiler, who previously was at the helm of Florida State teams for nine years. His Florida State teams won 189 games and lost 81. His teams had no losing seasons and played in seven district playoffs and three college world series.

Danny's complete college coaching records for 23 seasons shows 554 victories, 303 losses and eight ties for an excellent winning percentage of .646. This puts him in the top ten of the nation's winningest coaches.

Six of his Florida State players achieved All-America selection and many went on to professional ball.

Twenty of Litwhiler's players at Michigan State have earned first-team Big Ten selection. Three (Rob Ellis, Ron Pruitt and Al Weston) have made the All-America first team and three (John Biedenbach, Steve Garvey and Joe Palamara) the second team picked by the collegiate coaches. Five Spartans coached by Danny have made The Sports News All-America (Steve Garvey, Rick Miller, Rob Ellis, Ron Pruitt and Harry Kendrick) and two have been All-America Academic first-team (Jerry Sachmann and Dale Frietch).

Many of his performers have reached major league ranks, including Florida Staters Dick Howser (New York Yankees), Noody Moodward (Cincinnati Reds) and Ken Suarez (Cleveland Indians); and Spartans Bruce Look (New York Yankees), Steve Garvey (Los Angeles Dodgers), Dick Billings (St. Louis Cardinals), Mel Behney (Cincinnati Reds), Rick Miller (Boston Red Sox), Rob Ellis (Milwaukee Brewers), Ron Pruitt (Cleveland Indians) and Rick Kreuger (Boston Red Sox).

Litwhiler, a 1939 graduate of Bloomsburg, Pa. State College, spent 12 years as a player in the majors before stepping down in 1951, when he was appointed coach for the Cincinnati Reds. During that time he played with the Philadelphia Phillies, St. Louis Cardinals, the old Boston Braves and the Cincinnati Reds. Danny was with the Cardinals in the 1943 and 1944 World Series, and played in the 1942 All-Star game.

He managed in professional ball for three seasons. He was player-manager of Fargo, N.D. in 1952, at Wilkes-Barre, Pa. in 1953 and at Jamestown, N.Y. and Duluth, Minn. in 1954. From there he joined the Florida State staff.

Among his memorable performances is his string of 21 straight games in which he hit safely in his first season in the majors. In 1941 he belted a home run in every National League park.

Litwhiler was a perfectionist in the field. He became the first major leaguer to play an entire season without making an error. That was in 1942 when he handled 317 chances in 151 games.

Over a period of two seasons he set a record of playing 187 consecutive games without an error. This feat put Litwhiler's glove in baseball's Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y.

His best full season at bat came in 1941 when he hit .305. He had a lifetime average of .282.

Litwhiler is known for several innovations in coaching, such as an unbreakable mirror for pitchers to use for checking their throwing, and employment of a bat sawed in half to teach bunting. Recently, Litwhiler came up with the idea of using a radar gun to chart the velocity of pitches. The clever use of the device has brought interested responses from many major league teams and it is being manufactured as JUGS. He also developed a product to dry out baseball fields, manufactured as Diamond Grit. He's also constantly seeking to improve the attractiveness of the home baseball games and the last five years has had batgirls working at home contests.

Litwhiler has contributed to several baseball publications. They include "Fundamentals of Baseball" by University Press, 1956; "Baseball Glossary" in English, Dutch, Italian and Spanish, by University Press, 1958; "Baseball Coaches Guide to Drills and Skills," by Prentice-Hall, 1963; "Baseball" by Prentice-Hall, 1967, and "Treasury of Baseball Drills...Featuring Favorites of Top Coaches," by Parker Publishing Company, 1978.

His alma mater honored him in 1973 by naming its new baseball stadium in his name. Danny also received a special honor several summers ago from his home in the State of Pennsylvania. He was inducted into the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in 1974. He is past president of the American Coaches of College Baseball Coaches and in 1978 was elected international president of the United States Baseball Foundation.

Danny was born Aug. 31, 1916, at Ringtown, Pa. He is married to Patricia Walsh James. Mrs. Litwhiler received her B.S. and M.A. degrees from Michigan State. Three children, Marcia, Dick and Nancy have graduated from MSU. They have ten children, seven girls and three boys.

Son Dick was a pitcher on the Spartan varsity eleven years ago. He received his M.A. degree in physical education and now teaches in that field and is Director of Intramurals at Georgia Southwestern. Son Danny teaches math and assists the baseball coach at the Air Force Academy. Son Mark is majoring in physical education at Aquinas College and is on the varsity soccer team.

Continuing a longtime association with Michigan State baseball is Frank E. Pellerin, member of Spartan teams as an undergraduate, and a staff member for the 24th season.

He was appointed as assistant coach in 1953, working with the late John H. Kobs, and the same assignment was extended in 1963 with present head man Danny Litwhiler.

During Pellerin's tenure, Spartan baseballers have pleyd more than 900 games (919 games, 561 wins, 346 losses and 12 ties), won two Big Ten team titles (in 1954 and in 1971) and placed second three times. He's helped coach the Spartans in 24 of their 27 Big Ten seasons and has had a hand in the development of 34 athletes who've earned All-Big Ten first-team selection.

Pellerin played under Kobs at State, earning varsity letters in 1941, 1942 and 1943 with stints at second base and at third base. He enrolled at State after graduation from Redford High School in Detroit where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball.

His first teaching and coaching position was at Highland Park, Mich. High School, where he remained until joining the Michigan State staff in September, 1953.

While at Highland Park, Pellerin was head baseball coach, assisted in swimming, football, basketball and physical education classes, and also taught classes in mathematics.

Pellerin received the master's degree in counseling and guidance in 1951 at Wayne State University. He and wife, Nancy, have two sons, Michael and Tim.

TOM SMITH Freshman Coach

In his ninth season as J.V. baseball caoch at Michigan State is Thomas W. Smith, who was appointed to the post in September of 1967.

He had served unofficially in the capacity the previous four years while working towards his B.S. degree. In the years that he's handled the Spartan young players, the MSU varsity has recorded an impressive 241-137-6 won-lost-tied mark.

Smith enrolled at State as an undergraduate after playing in professional baseball from 1961 to 1963 with the Milwaukee Braves organization. He was a catcher. He went with the Braves following high school graduation.

Tom is a native of Coldwater, Mich., born Dec. 9, 1942. He graduated from Coldwater High School in 1961 and immediately signed his professional contract. He received his B.S. degree in physical education in March, 1967 and his master's degree in March of 1971.

In addition to his coaching duties, Smith teaches in physical education. He and wife, Jane Marie, have two daughters, Jamie and Julie.

1979 PROSPECTS

State Per

Despite the loss of three outstanding hitters and two regular pitchers, Michigan State should be a Big Ten baseball title contender again in 1979.

So says veteran coach Danny Litwhiler, whose Spartan clubs almost always are near the top of the league standings. The 1978 team finished second at 11-5 and went on to NCAA midwest regional competition. The overall mark was 33-21.

The big losses are that of All-America outfielder Kirk Gibson, who batted .390, hammered 16 home runs, and drove in 52 tallies in 48 games; All-Big Ten third baseman Tony Spada, with a .421 average, eight homers and 43 RBIs, and first sacker Jerry Weller, at .293 with three homers and 23 RBIs. Departed pitcher Chuck Baker had a 6-4 mark and Larry Pashnick was 3-6.

Key veterans around whom this year's club will be built are shortstop Rodger Bastien, who batted .353 after a slow start, and second baseman Randy Hop. Outfielders back are Tom Schultz (.322), Ken Robinson (.292) and Joe Lopez (.361 in 23 games). Returning moundsmen include Brian Holcott (9-3) and Mark Pomorski (6-3).

A rundown by positions:

Pitching

The Spartan pitching staff, which showed great improvement in 1978, should be even better this time around. Junior Brian Holcott is pegged as MSU's top starter. He fashioned a 9-3 record in 12 starts, led the team in strikeouts with 53, and fired three shutouts. Complementing him is sophomore Mark Pomorski, who had 10 starting assignments last year and led the Spartans with 77.2 innings pitched. Also among those hoping for starting duty are returnees Cary Tyler (1-0), Jay Strother (4-2) and lefty Eric Rosekrans (2-1). There's also freshman Risto Nicevski and southpaw transfer Tim Birtsas. Senior Jim Cotter, the team's top relief specialist two seasons back, is hoping for a return to form after a blood clot in his arm sidelined him last season. Rounding out this depth-filled staff are senior reliever Mark Sutherland (1-2), junior Greg Butzirus, sophomores Steve Kruse and Phil Magsig, and freshman Ruben Luna.

Catching

Sophomore Mark Russ, junior Jerry Pollard, and senior Larry Hohs shared the catching duties last season, and all are back for 1979. Russ, who batted .254 with two homers, may also see action at third base. Pollard hit .164, Hohs .244 in 1978. Freshman Eric Payk, along with juniors Roger Martin and Tim Leite are also receivers on the squad.

Infield

State's infield is strong up the middle, questionable at the corners. Shortstop Rodger Bastien and second baseman Randy Hop both return. Bastien raised his average 91 points to .353 and made All-Big Ten as a junior. Hop fell from .279 in 1977 to .193 last season, but fielded well and hopes to regain his batting eye. The problems are at first and third base, where incumbents Jerry Weller and Tony Spada have departed. Litwhiler lists sophomores Brad Bebben, Jim Buterakos, Al Dankovich and John Walker as possible third basemen, though the latter three can play second or short as well. Freshman Chris Dorr and junior Kirk Haines (.256 mostly as a designated hitter) will battle for the starting first baseman duties.

Outfield

Although All-American Kirk Gibson is now playing for the Detroit Tigers, MSU's outfield figures to be almost as strong this season. Ken Robinson is back at his familiar leftfield post, while 1978's regular rightfielder, Tom Schultz, will assume Gibson's old spot in center. That leaves Joe Lopez, who came on a mid-season and hit .361 in 23 contests, as the top right-field candidate. Robinson averaged .292 with five homers last season, while Schultz batted a fine .322 with three roundtrippers. Junior Ed Stull, sophomores Ken Mehall and Tim Kearly, and yearling Chris Dorr stand in reserve.

MSU BASEBALL SPRING TRAINING TRIP Edinburg, Texas

Michigan State's baseball team appears to be a solid contender in the Big Ten title race, despite a less than impressive record on its spring training trip.

The Spartans were only 4-12 in games played at Pan American University in Edinburg, Texas, but State coaches discovered a number of bright spots.

The squad's pitching proved it will be Michigan State's strength in 1979. Five flingers posted earned run averages below the 3.24, led by relief ace Steve Kruse with a nifty 1.50 mark.

Sidearm righthander Brian Molcott was State's top starting pitcher, going 1-1 with a 3.06 ERA and 16 strikeouts in 14 and 2/3 innings.

Starters Jay Strother, Greg Butzirus, Jim Cotter and Mark Pomorski also proved effective on the mound and will provide a wealth of pitching depth.

Stingy defense will be a trademark of Spartan fortunes as the fielders sparked under the Texas sun.

Second baseman Randy Hop and shortstop Rodger Bastien formed a tight double play combination and catcher Jerry Pollard showed he is capable of throwing out quite a few base stealers.

On the offensive side of the plate, the Spartans visibly missed sluggers Kirk Gibson and Tony Spada.

Freshman first baseman Chris Dorr shone with a .381 batting average, including one home run and two doubles in just 21 times at bat.

Leftfielder Ken Robinson hit .350, with the bulk of that mark coming on a torrid spree after a slow start. Randy Hop appears to have bounced back from his disappointing year at the plate in 1978, as he slugged away at a .333 mark in Texas.

Rodger Bastien also batted a .333 as did designated hitter Ken Mehall who could be State's next power threat.

The Spartans need heavy hitting from outfielders Tom Schultz and Joe Lopez. Both enjoyed .300 seasons last year but suffered through a difficult spring training trip.

All-Conference selection in both baseball and basketball at Grandville High. Served as captain and gained MVP honors with the cage team. Born 3-22-57. Majoring in english.
- JIM BUTERAKOS -- 5-10, 165, So., Shortstop (throws right, bats right), Flint (Southwestern). Excellent prospect, but has seen little playing time while backing up Bastien. Good speed exemplified by his six steals in eight attempts last season. Can play any infield position. Lettered three years in high school baseball and was voted captain his senior year. His Flint teams compiled a 66-26 slate. Jim acquired All-City, All-Valley, All-District, and Honorable Mention All-America honors. Also lettered twice in football and earned second team All-State recognition. Born 1-14-59. Majoring in business.
- GREG BUTZIRUS -- 6-2, 190, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Battle Creek (Pennfield). A fine all-round athlete, Greg comes to MSU after spending two years at Kellogg Community College. Playing baseball, basketball, and golf, Greg won a total of seven letters in high school. His baseball honors included All-League, All-Regional, and All-State. Born 1-22-58. The Spartan bullpen is hoping to welcome back Cotter this season. Made 19 appearances two seasons ago and finished with a 4-3 wonlost mark. Throws sidearm and is very tough on right hand hitters. An All-Conference and All-Area choice in high school. Born 10-14-56. Major is elementary education.
- AL DANKOVICH -- 6-0, 180, So., Shortstop (throws right, bats right), Hazel Crest, Ill. (Hillcrest). Hopes to provide back-up for Bastien. Al's impressive list of prep awards include Most Improved Player, All-State, MVP, and twice All-Conference. During his two years as a member of coach Bob Valiska's varsity team, Al led them to a 31-17 record. Lettered in basketball as well as baseball at Hillcrest. Born 11-5-59. Has not yet specified a major.
- CHRIS DORR -- 6-0, 180, Fr., First Base (throws right, bats right), Coldwater (Coldwater). Will battle Kirk Haines for starting first baseman duties Can also play outfield. Strong hitter who is bright Spartan prospect. Highly-acclaimed out of Coldwater High where he played baseball and football. Twice earned first team all-state honors and was three-time all-conference performer in diamond sport. Also made all-conference twice and honorable mention all-state once in football. Born 5-1-60. Has not selected an academic major.
- BRAD GEBBEN -- 6-2, 205, So., Third baseman (throws right, bats right), Portage (Central). Fine prospect with good power. Batted only 18 times last spring, collecting two hits. Should be a candidate for vacant first baseman's slot. While in high school, Brad was named All-League and All-District in both baseball and football. Received high school award as

best scholar-athlete in 1976-77. His 1977 Portage Central team won the Greater Kalamazoo Tournament in which he hit the longest home run of 426 feet. Played in Connie Mack World Series in Farmington, New Mexico two summers ago. Born 6-18-59. Nickname is "Stick." Major is marketing.

- KIRK HAINES -- 5-11, 190, Jr., First Base (throws right, bats left), Millington (Millington). Hit .256 as a part-time player last year. Playing mostly second base, he handled 59 chances without a miscue. Kirk has the inside track for the first base job left vacant by Jerry Weller's graduation. Received All-State acclaim as a shortstop in high school. Captained basketball team in 1976. Born 7-1-58. Nickname is "Korky". Majoring in parks and recreation resources.
- LARRY HOHS -- 6-1, 205, Sr., Catcher (throws right, bats right), Grand Rapids (West Catholic). Batted .244 last spring as he split the catching with Mark Russ and Jerry Pollard. - KEN ROBINSON -- 6-1, 190, Sr., Outfielder (throws right, bats left), Ypsilanti (Ypsilanti). Hill stay in left field, replacing Kirk Gibson. Hit .292 last year with 5 homers and 7 doubles. Second on the team in steals with 12 in 13 attempts. Third team All-Big Ten Outfielder in 1977. Defensive back on the MSU football squad. Won nine letters as an athlete at Ypsi. All-State selection in baseball and football. Earned MVP honors with his grid and basketball teams. All-League selection in baseball three times. Ken's father played minor league baseball in the Chicago Cubs organization. Born 1-6-57. Major is political science.
- ERIC ROSEKRANS -- 5-10, 165, Sr., Pitcher (throws left, bats left), East Lansing (East Lansing). Led 1978 Spartan staff with a glittering 1.77 ERA, Split time between relief and starting duties. Figures to be bullpen ace this season. Born 8-5-57. Nickname is "Rosey." Majoring in education.
- MARK RUSS -- 5-11, 174, So., Catcher (throws right, bats right), Lansing(Sexton). His .254 batting average in '78 was tops among the three Spartan backstops. Also displayed good speed with 8 steals in 9 attempts. In 1977, as a senior at Sexton, Mark too All-City and All-Metro catching honors. Also was a National Honor Society member. Born 12-30-58. Major is business.
- TOM SCHULTZ -- 6-3, 190, Jr., Outfielder (throws right, bats right), Grand Rapids (Union). Had fine season at the plate last year batting at a .322 clip and slamming 13 extra base hits. If defense improves, he'll be in the outfield in '79. Otherwise, he'll be the designated hitter. At Union, he captured All-League and All-State honors in baseball as well as All-League status in football (split end). In senior season, Tom was captain and MVP of his baseball team. Born 2-27-58. Major is accounting.

- JAY STROTHER -- 5-11, 165, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Upper St. Clair, Pa. (Upper St. Clair). Counted on as member of this year's starting rotation. Dividing his time between relief and starting assignments last season, Jay had a 4-2 record to compliment his fine 2.38 ERA. Has good control and above average curve. Lettered twice in football and once in track in addition to getting three baseball monograms in high school. After one year at Darien High in Darien, Conn., Jay pitched his Upper St. Clair team to 14 wins in two seasons making him the winningest pitcher ever at his school. Born 10-13-57. A pre-dentistry major.
- ED STULL -- 6-0, 193, Jr., Outfielder (throws right, bats right), Oxford (Oxford). Saw very limited action last season, appearing in only one game. Twice named MVP at Oxford. Named on the All-State Regional team in '76. Member of National Honors Society twice while at Oxford. Also won Outstanding Senior Award. Born 6-25-58. Majoring in mechanical/biomedical engineering.
 - MARK SUTHERLAND -- 6-0, 170, Sr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Garden City (West). Had only one start among his 11 appearances last year. Pitches mostly in short relief. Had a 1-2 log and 4.28 ERA in '78. Good sinking fastball. Originally an infielder with the Spartans. Served as captain of his Garden City West team. Also earned MVP and All-League honors. Born 9-15-57. A business accounting major.
 - GARY TYLER -- 6-4, 195, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Kalamazoo (Central). Appeared in only three games last year, winning his honly decision against Western Michigan. Has good fastball and curve, but couldn't find the plate consistently enough in '78. Captained 1975 high school squad and helped his team compile a 40-17 record in two seasons. Received honorable mention among Michigan high school pitchers. Also lettered in swimming and diving at Central. Born 11-11-57. Majoring in parks and recreation resources.
- BRIAN MOLCOTT -- 6-0, 170, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Plymouth (Salem). Winner of the Bullpen Club Leading Pitcher Award for 1978. Also named to the Big Ten All-Academic team. While tieing for the club lead in appearances with 13, Brian won 9 of 12 decisions and sported a 3.96 ERA. His nine wins were three more than anyone else on the team could garner. He also threw three of the team's five shutouts. 4-2 record as a freshman. Displays poise and good control. As a senior at Salem, he fired a 16-0 record and was named to All-State, All-League, and All-Area teams. As a basketball guard, Brian was voted to the All-Suburban first team. Also received the school's outstanding athlete award. Born 2-12-58. Majoring in health, physical education and recreation.

DANNY LITHHILER Head Coach

Daniel W. Litwhiler, former major league baseball star, has coached the diamond sport at Michigan State University for 15 seasons.

He moved in as head coach of the Spartans in the fall of 1963 and in 15 full years his clubs have played 649 games, winning 398, losing 243 and tying eight, for a fine winning percentage of .619.

His 1978 outfit won 33, lost 21 and placed second in Big Ten standings with an 11-5 mark. MSU also participated in the NCAA midwest regional tournament.

All but two of his Michigan State teams have posted winning records in overall play and only one has ever finished out of the conference first division.

One of Litwhiler's best units was the 1971 varsity that won 36 games, most ever for a State nine, losing only ten. It won MSU's second Big Ten team title in history.

The head coaching position at State is the second in collegiate ranks for Litwhiler, who previously was at the helm of Florida State teams for nine years. His Seminole teams won 189 games and lost 81. His teams had no losing seasons and played in seven district playoffs and three college world series.

Danny's complete college coaching records for 24 seasons shows 587 victories, 324 losses and eight ties for an excellent winning percentage of .642. This puts him in the top ten of the nation's winningest coaches.

Twenty-three of Litwhiler's players at Michigan State have earned first-team Big Ten selection. Four (Rob Ellis, Ron Pruitt, Al Meston and Kirk Gibson) have made the All-America first team and three (John Biedenbach, Steve Garvey, and Joe Palamara) the second team picked by the collegiate coaches. Six Spartans coached by Danny have made The Sporting News All-America (Steve Garvey, Rick Miller, Rob Ellis, Ron Pruitt, Harry Kendrick and Kirk Gibson) and two have been All-America Academic first team (Jerry Sachmann and Dale Frietch). Pitcher Brian Molcott made the Big Ten's first All-Academic Team in 1978.

Many of his performers have reached major league ranks, including Florida Staters Dick Howser (New York Yankees), Woody Hoodward (Cincinnati Reds) and Ken Suarez (Cleveland Indians); and Spartans Bruce Look (New York Yankees), Steve Garvey (Los Angeles Dodgers), Dick Billings (St. Louis Cardinals), Mel Behney (Cincinnati Reds), Rick Miller (Boston Red Sox), Rob Ellis (Milwaukee Brewers), Ron Pruitt (Cleveland Indians) and Rick Dreuger (Boston Red Sox).

Litwhiler, a 1939 graduate of Bloomsburg, Pa. State College, spent 12 years as a player in the majors before stepping down in 1951, when he was appointed a fulltime coach for the Cincinnati Reds. During that time he played with the Philadelphia Phillies, St. Louis Cardinals, the old Boston Braves and the Cincinnati Reds. Danny was with the Cardinals in the 1943 and 1944 World Series, and played in the 1942 All-Star game.

He managed in professional ball for three seasons. He was player-manager of Fargo, N.D. in 1952, at Wilkes-Barre, Pa. in 1953 and at Jamestown, N.Y. and Duluth, Minn. in 1954. From there he joined the Florida State staff.

Among his memorable performances is his string of 21 straight games in which he hit safely in his first season in the majors. In 1941 he belted a home run in every National League park.

DANNY LITWHILER, Cont'd.

Litwhiler was a perfectionist in the field. He became the first major leaguer to play an entire season without making an error. That was in 1942 when he handled 317 chances in 151 games. All told, he played a record 187 consecutive games without an error. The feat won Litwhiler two Golden Glove (1942-43) (awards and put his glove in the baseball's Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y.

His best full season at bat came in 1941 when he hit .305. He had a lifetime average of .282.

Litwhiler is known for several innovations in coaching, such as an unbreakable Mirror for pitchers to use for checking their throwing, and employment of a bat sawed in half to teach bunting. Recently, Litwhiler came up with the idea of using a radar gun to chart the velocity of pitches. The clever use of the device has brought interested responses from many major league teams and it is being manufactured as JUGS. He also developed a product to dry out baseball fields, manufactured as Diamond Grit. He's also constantly seeking to improve the attractiveness of the home baseball games and the last six years has had bat-girls working at home contests.

Litwhiler has contributed to several baseball publications. They include "Fundamentals of Baseball" by University Press, 1956; "Baseball Glossary" in English, Dutch, Italian, Spanish, Korean, and Japanese, by University Press, 1958; "Baseball Coaches Guide to Drills and Skills," by Prentice-Hall, 1963; "Baseball" by Prentice-Hall, 1967, and "Treasury of Baseball Drills . . . Featuring Favorites of Top Coaches," by Parker Publishing Company, 1979.

His alma mater honored him in 1973 by naming its new baseball stadium in his name. Danny also received a special honor several summers ago from his home in the State of Pennsylvania. He was inducted into the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in 1974. He is past president of the American Coaches of College Baseball Coaches and in 1978 was elected international president of the United States Baseball Federation.

Danny was born Aug. 31, 1916, at Ringtown, Pa. He is married to Patricia Walsh James. Mrs. Litwhiler received her B.S. and M.A. degrees from Michigan State. Three children, Marcia, Dick and Nancy have graduated from MSU. They have ten children, seven girls and three boys.

Son Dick was a pitcher on the Spartan varsity twelve years ago. He received his M.A. degree in physical education and now teaches in that field and is Director of Intramurals at Georgia Southwestern. Son Danny teaches math and assists the baseball coach at the Air Force Academy. Son Mark is majoring in physical education at Aquinas College and is on the varsity soccer team.

Continuing a longtime association with Michigan State baseball is Frank E. Pellerin, member of Spartan teams as an undergraduate, and a staff member for the 24th season.

He was appointed as assistant coach in 1953, working with the late John H. Kobs, and the same assignment was extended in 1963 with present head man Danny Litwhiler.

During Pellerin's tenure, Spartan baseballers have played more than 900 games (973 games, 594 wins, 367 losses and 12 ties), won two Big Ten team titles (in 1954 and in 1971) and placed second four times. He's helped coach the Spartans in 25 of their 28 Big Ten seasons and has had a hand in the development of 38 athletes who've earned All-Big Ten first-team selection.

Pellerin played under Kobs at State, earning varsity letters in 1941, 1942 and 1943 with stints at second base and at third base. He enrolled at State after graduation from Redford High School in Detroit where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball.

His first teaching and coaching position was at Highland Park, Mich. High School, where he remained until joining the Michigan State staff in September, 1953.

While at Highland Park, Pellerin was head baseball coach, assisted in swimming, football, basketball and physical education classes, and also taught classes in mathematics.

Pellerin received the master's degree in counseling and guidance in 1951 at Wayne State University. He and wife, Nancy, have two sons, Michael and Tim.

TOM SMITH Freshman Coach

In his 10th season as J.V. baseball coach at Michigan State is Thomas W. Smith, who was appointed to the post in September of 1967.

He had served unofficially in the capacity the previous four years while working towards his B.S. degree. In the years that he's handled the Spartan young players, the MSU varsity has recorded an impressive 274-158-6 won-lost-tied mark.

Smith enrolled at State as an undergraduate after playing in professional baseball from 1961 to 1963 with the Milwaukee Braves organization. He was a catcher. He went with the Braves following high school graduation.

Tom is a native of Coldwater, Mich., born Dec. 9, 1942. He graduated from Coldwater High School in 1961 and immediately signed his professional contract. He received his B.S. degree in physical education in March, 1967 and his master's degree in March of 1971.

In addition to his coaching duties, Smith teaches physical education. He and wife, Jane Marie, have two daughters, Jamie and Julie.

1980 PROSPECTS

Michigan State's Big Ten championship baseball team expects to be a leading contender for the 1980 conference title as the Spartans gun for their third straight NCAA post-season tournament appearance. Veteran diamond coach Danny Litwhiler returns 16 lettermen from last season's club which posted won-lost records of 11-4 in the Big Ten and 28-27 overall. Pitching and hitting should be improved over last year while defense, especially in the revamped infield, might be slightly weaker than in 1979. Michigan State's schedule begins with a 13-game spring training trip to Pan American University in Edinburg, Texas, and the rigorous Big Ten slate will be especially tough in the early going with games against title contenders Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota. Graduation losses include the solid double play combination of shortstop Rodger Bastien (MSU's top hitter last year) and second baseman Randy Hop, rightfielder Joe Lopez and pitchers Jim Cotter and Mark Sutherland. Key returnees are All-Big Ten first sacker Chris Dorr (.307), leftfielder Ken Robinson (.317, 35 RBIs), centerfielder Tom Schultz (five home runs, 26 RBIs), rightfielder Mark Russ (converted from catcher), catcher Jerry Pollard, designated hitter Ken Mehall (.281) and pitchers Brian Wolcott, Jay Strother, Phil Magsig, Greg Butzirus and Mark Pomorski. Here is a rundown by positions:

Pitching

The Spartan moundsmen will be more experienced and talented this year. Ace righthander Brian Wolcott (6-4, 4.43 ERA) is expected to be the top starter and he is just four victories shy of the MSU career record of 23. The senior control artist has healed from his sore arm and will be relied upon for his steady performances. Another senior righthander, Jay Strother, suffered through a sub-par 1979 campaign with arm troubles but should be back to full strength this spring. Strother was 4-6 with a 3.98 earned run average last season. Junior righthander Phil Magsig led the squad with a 2.18 ERA and his continued improvement should land a starting assignment. Greg Butzirus (senior righthander, 1-3, 4.87 ERA) could be the fourth starter if he overcomes occasional wildness. Two-year regular Mark Pomorski (junior righthander, 3-4, 5.81) hopes to return to his earlier form after suffering through control problems. The bullpen will be solid with southpaws Tim Birtsas and Steve Kruse and righty Risto Nicevski. Freshmen Brian James, Terry Johnson and Steve Sudbay could also be heard from.

Catching

Senior Jerry Pollard (.269) has developed greatly during his three letterwinning campaigns and he is a durable receiver who handles pitchers well. His strong arm and dangerous bat are assets. Steve Barnes, Eric Payk and Larry Young are reserve catchers.

Outfield

The Spartan outfield is strong and fast and will provide a majority of the offensive firepower. Leftfielder Ken Robinson led the team in 1979 with five triples and 35 RBIs and he also stole 11 bases in 12 attempts. The switch-hitting senior ranks among Spartan career leaders in hits, runs, doubles and runs batted in. Senior centerfielder Tom Schultz endured back and leg injuries last season but he is a strong fielder and slugger with good speed. Junior Mark Russ will replace the graduated Joe Lopez in right field. Russ is an excellent hitting prospect with a good arm and speed. Junior Tim Kearly and sophomore Rob Silverstein are solid backups in the outfield.

Infield

Michigan State's infield will be strong at the corners and untested up the middle. First baseman Chris Dorr made the All-Big Ten team as a freshman and he is considered a great hitting prospect. The hot corner at third base is up for grabs and Brad Gebben (.300 in 16 games) appears to have the inside track. Bill Schulz (.368 in seven games) will challenge for the starting role. Freshman switch-hitter Tom Dieters is expected to fill the vacancy at shortstop and Jim Buterakos and Al Dankovich (regular at third base last year) will contend at second base. Steve Kinney is a reserve shortstop and Kirk Haines is a valuable utility man who can play the infield or outfield.

Established impressive credentials in prep ranks, compiling a career won-lost record of 25-2 and 0.62 earned run average. Made the 1979 all-state squad and twice was accorded all-league, all-regional and all-area honors. Also was named team MVP last year as Plymouth Canton rolled to a 68-14 record during his career. Nickname is "B.J." Born 5-8-61 in Detroit. Majoring in business.
- TERRY JOHNSON -- 6-2, 185, Fr., Pitcher (throws left, bats left), Grandville (Grandville). Highly-acclaimed freshman lefthanded pitcher who could make immediate contributions. Thows excellent curve and fast balls and can be used as a first baseman and outfielder. Posted an 8-1 mound record with a 0.59 earned run average his prep senior campaign. Also slugged at a .435 clip. Made first team all-state in 1979 and honorable mention as a junior. Also lettered in football and basketball. Was a four-year high school student council member and served two years on his class executive board. Comes from athletic family. Father, Robert Johnson, played baseball at Western Michigan in the early 1950s; brother, Mike, ran track and cross country at Western Michigan from 1974-1977 and uncle, Tom Wines, was a Spartan swimmer in the mid-1950s. Born 8-23-61 in Grand Rapids. Business major.
 - TIM KEARLY -- 6-0, 195, Jr., Outfield (throws left, bats left), Hancock (Hancock). Saw limited action last year (most of it during spring training) but will challenge for a starting berth in the outfield. Possesses excellent outfield skills, is fast and potentially could be a dangerous batter. Hit only .143 in 13 games last season. Earned nine prep letters (three each in football, basketball and track) but high school did not have a baseball team, so he played American Legion ball, winning all-league and team MVP honors. Father, Ted Kearly, is athletic director at Michigan Tech and a Spartan diamond letterman in 1957-1958. Born 1-15-59 in Hastings. Majoring in business.

- STEVE KINNEY -- 5-10, 160, Jr., Shortstop (throws right, bats left), Ypsilanti (Ypsilanti). Will contend with freshman Tom Dieters for opening at shortstop. Saw spot duty behind Rodger Bastien last year, batting .389 in 11 games. Allleague and honorable mention all-state in high school. Also lettered in football and basketball and was a National Honor Society member. Father, Richard, played baseball at Hestern Michigan. Belongs to Delta Sigma Phi fraternity. Born 1-13-59. Academic major is elementary education.
- STEVE KRUSE -- 5-11, 170, Jr., Pitcher (throws left, bats left), East Lansing (East Lansing). Promising lefthanded fireball pitcher. Must improve control if he is to break into starting rotation. Has been bothered by a sore arm the last two seasons. Posted a 3-2 record and the team's third-best ERA of 3.47 last spring. Has a standout hurler on East Lansing High's 1977 Capitol Area Conference championship squad. Selected honorable mention all-state, all-league and all-district. Brother, Andy Kruse, is a sophomore catcher at Central Michigan. Enjoys hunting, fishing and T-shirt collecting. Born 12-23-58 in Tampa, Fla. Majoring in communications.
- PHIL MAGSIG -- 5-10, 160, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Dansville (Dansville). One of MSU's most improved pitchers, this righthander should move into the starting rotation. Led last year's staff with a 2.18 earned run average and racked up a 3-1 won-lost record, including a Mideast regional playoff victory over Miami (Ohio). Hon the Spartan pitcher's award for retiring the highest percentage of leadoff batters. A deceptive curve ball is one of his strong points. Selected high school squad's most valuable player and all-league three years. Also played basketball and ran cross country. Born 10-3-58. General business major.

KEN MEHALL -- 6-2, 200, Jr., Outfield (throws right, bats left), Southgate (Acuinas). This strong, lefthanded pull-hitter possesses tremendous athletic ability, but has yet to reach his full potential. Made the 1979 Big Ten All-Academic squad with a 3.02 grade point average in marketing. Also picked to the Mideast regional all-tournament team. As designated hitter last year he hit .201 with 17 RBIs. Probably will DH again this season. Was the tournament's MVP when his Adray Appliance team won the 1978 AAABA national championship. High school squad placed second in the state in 1976 and he made all-state, allleague and all-area. Member of the National Honor Society and listed in Who's Who of American High School Students. Born 6-15-59 in Detroit.

- RISTO NICEVSKI -- 5-11, 205, So. Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Flint (Southwestern). Enters season in improved physical shape and with a bright outlook. Hardest thrower on the staff (90 mph fastball) and now has mastered an assortment of off-speed pitches. Cool performer in pressure situations, he is slated for short relief appearances. Had no decisions in four games last year with a 3.52 ERA in seven and two-thirds innings. Led his high school squad to the 1978 state championship and made the all-city and all-valley honor teams. Prep coach was Marv Rettenmund, cousin of former major leaguer Merv Rettenmund. Born 12-18-59 in Yugoslavia. Majoring in general business.
 - JERRY POLLARD -- 5-11, 190, Sr., Catcher (throws right, bats right), Livonia (Franklin). Experienced catcher who has been a starter the last three seasons. Steadily improving batsman with a strong throwing arm. Selected team most improved last year, improving batting average from .164 in 1978 to .269 in 1979. Made honorable mention all-state, all-league and all-district in both prep baseball and football. Brother, Joe Pollard, played football at Grand Valley State Colleges. Enjoys all sports. Born 1-26-58 in Dearborn. Academic major is marketing.

- MARK POMORSKI -- 6-0, 180, Jr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Birmingham (Groves). Hill be in tough fight to regain starting assignment after disappointing 1979 season in which he was 3-4 with a 5.81 ERA. Hopes to return to 1973 form which featured a 6-3 record, 2.54 earned run average and seven complete games. This righthander suffered control problems last season but his experience as a two-year starter undoubtedly will prove valuable to Spartan fortunes. Captained his prep team and was accorded honorable mention all-state, all-league, all-county and all-regional honors. Played hockey as a youngster. Father, Bernard, played baseball at Olivet College and in the Army in the 1950s. Born 10-16-59 in Detroit. Majoring in business.
- KEN ROBINSON -- 6-1, 190, Sr., Outfield (throws right, bats both), Ypsilanti (Ypsilanti). Highly talented outfielder who is the team's leading returning batsman. Compiled a .317 batting average, nine doubles, four home runs, 82 total bases, 11-for-12 in stolen bases, and MSU-leading figures of five triples and 35 RBIs last year. Ranks among Spartan career leaders in hits (128), doubles (21), runs (88) and runs batted in (73). Owns a lifetime .295 batting average. This switch-hitting speedster has earned three varsity letters in baseball and one as a quarterback/defensive back with the football team in 1977. Made the All-Big Ten third team as a freshman. Mon nine high school letters (three each in baseball, football and basketball) and made all-state on the diamond, All-America and all-state as a gridder and all-league in basketball. Graduated with honors. Father, Ken Sr., played minor league baseball with the Chicago Cubs. Enjoys guitar. Born 1-6-57 in Ann Arbor. Political science major.
- MARK RUSS -- 5-11, 170, Jr., Outfield (throws right, bats right), Lansing (Sexton). Converted catcher who will start in rightfield. Has unlimited batting potential and great power, but has not yet shown full abilities with .254 and .239 averages his first two letterwinning Spartan campaigns. Committed just one error in 101 chances behind the plate last year. Good speed exemplified by 12 career stolen bases in 13 tries. Captained his high school team and was selected all-city and all-metro as well as a member of the National Honor Society. Likes hunting, fishing, camping and all sports. Born 12-30-58 in Lansing. Majoring in recreation and youth leadership.
- TOM SCHULTZ -- 6-3, 200, Sr., Outfield (throws right, bats right), Grand Rapids (Union). Talented power hitter who will be a fixture in centerfield for the third consecutive season. Hit .257 in 1979, after a .322 slate the year before, batting mostly in the cleanup slot. Second on the squad with five home runs and tied for second with 10 doubles and 26 RBIs. Named to the 1979 All-Big Ten third team. Flashy fielder with shoestring catches and good baserunner with 20-for-24 career statistics in base stealing. A draftee of the Detroit Tigers after high school, he made the all-state team three years and was all-league in baseball and football. Set a state prep record with 54 stolen bases in one season. Born 2-27-58 in Grand Rapids. Academic major is accounting.
 - BILL SCHULZ -- 6-2, 175, Sr., Third base (throws right, bats right), Saginaw (Arthur Hill). Saw some late-season action at first base last year but will contend with Brad Gebben at the hot corner this season. Strong hitter who swatted .363 in seven games. Was captain of prep baseball and basketball squads and was a two-year diamond team MVP and second-team all-valley selection. Born 8-2-53 in Saginaw. Majoring in criminal justice.
 - JAY STROTHER -- 6-0, 170, Sr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Pittsburgh, Pa. (Upper St. Clair). Michigan State's No. 2 starter who has healed from sore arm that plagued him after mid-season. Began well with shutouts in first two Big Ten games but finished with a 4-6 record and 3.98 ERA.

Led the staff with six complete games in 11 starts. Was 4-2 with a 2.38 ERA in 1978. A cool customer in pressure situations, he throws a good curve ball and has fine control. Attended Darien High School in Connecticut for one year then established himself as the winningest pitcher in Upper St. Clair High School history with a two-year 16-4 record. Graduated with academic honors. Member of Phi Gamma Delta fraternity. Born 10-13-57 in Indianapolis, Ind. Business major.

STEVE SUDBAY -- 6-1, 175, Fr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), M. Bloomfield (W. Bloomfield). Freshman recruit who pitched well in fall drills and could see bullpen duty this spring. Compiled a 4-2 prep record last year, earning allleague, all-county, all-regional and team MVP accolades. Also played football and was a member of the National Honor Society. Father, Robert, was a hockey player at Norwich University. Born 9-14-60 in Delaware, Ohio. Academic major is general business.

BRIAN WOLCOTT -- 6-0, 170, Sr., Pitcher (throws right, bats right), Plymouth (Salem). The squad's ace pitcher who is expecting big things in 1980. A twotime Big Ten All-Academic honoree, he is back from an arm injury that led to enim sub-par 1979 campaign with a 6-4 record and 4.43 earned run average. Is four victories short of becoming Michigan State's all-time winningest hurler. Boasts a career 19-9 won-lost record with a 4.15 ERA, 120 strikeouts and 82 walks in 184 1/3 innings. Was 4-2 as a freshman and 9-3 the next season. Always draws the difficult starting assignments and he owns a good variety of pitches and delivers sidearm, submarine and over the top. Hon high school's outstanding scholar-athlete award his senior year and was a member of the National Honor Society. All-state and all-league on prep diamond and all-suburban in basketball. Baseball squad captured state championship his junior campaign. Enjoys traveling and all sports. Born 2-12-58 in Pontiac. Majoring in health, physi-Cal education and recreation. Head Coach

Daniel W. Litwhiler, former major league baseball star and 1979 District Coach of the Year, has coached the diamond sport at Michigan State University with great success for 16 seasons.

He moved in as Spartan head coach in the fall of 1963 and during his reign his clubs have played 704 games, winning 426, losing 270 and tying eight for a fine winning percentage of .611.

He guided the 1979 squad to the Big Ten championship, the third in Spartan history and second under his direction. plane alth the Philadelphic Philadelphic

Molding a tight-knit unit which featured determination and togetherness. Danny's team participated in NCAA post-season tournament action for the second consecutive year.

Litwhiler received one of baseball's highest honors in January of 1980 with induction into the American Association of College Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame. He is past president of that organization.

Danny is a member of the Citizen's Savings Athletic Foundation Hall of Fame and was entered into the Jerry Wolman Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in the summer of 1975.

DANNY LITWHILER, Cont'd.

The chapter, named after the one-time owner of the Philadelphia Eagles, since 1963 has cited men and women in athletics who by distinguished performance have brought honor to that part of the state.

He is on the advisory board for Babe Ruth Baseball, Inc., and has served the same distinction for the National Baseball Congress. Litwhiler has also been a member of the Board of Directors for the Department of State Athletic Advisory Council for International Sports, and has been recipient of the "Lefty Gomez" Award for outstanding contributions and distinguished service to college baseball. His alma mater (Bloomsburg, Pa. State College) honored him in 1973 by naming its new baseball stadium in his name.

Only two of Litwhiler's Michigan State teams have posted losing records in overall play and only two have finished out of the conference first division. One of his best units was the 1971 varsity that won 36 games -- most ever for a State nine -- lost only ten and captured the Big Ten title.

The head coaching position at MSU is the second in the collegiate ranks for Litwhiler, who previously directed the baseball program at Florida State for nine years. Those teams won 189 games and lost only 81, enjoying no losing seasons and playing in seven district playoffs and three college world series. Six of his Florida State performers achieved All-America status and many went on to professional ball.

Danny's complete college coaching record for 25 seasons features 615 victories against 351 losses and eight ties for a .636 winning percentage. He ranks among the nation's top ten winningest coaches.

Twenty-five of Litwhiler's players at Michigan State have earned first team All-Big Ten honors; four (Rob Ellis, Ron Pruitt, Al Veston and Kirk Gibson) have made the Coaches' All-America first team and three (John Biedenbach, Steve Garvey and Joe Palamara) the second team. Six Spartans coached by Danny have been selected to The Sporting News All-America squads (Rick Miller, Harry Kendrick, Garvey, Ellis, Pruitt and Gibson) and two (Jerry Sackmann and Dale Frietch) have made the Academic All-America first team.

Many of his performers have reached the major leagues including Florida Staters Dick Howser (New York Yankees) who was recently named manager of the Yankees, Woody Woodward (Cincinnati Reds) and Ken Suarez (Cleveland Indians), and Spartans Bruce Look (Minnesota Twins), Steve Garvey (Los Angeles Dodgers), Dick Billings (St. Louis Cardinals), Mel Behney (Cincinnati Reds), Rick Miller (Boston Red Sox), Rob Ellis (Milwaukee Brewers), Ron Pruitt (Cleveland Indians), Rick Krueger (Boston Red Sox) and Kirk Gibson (Detroit Tigers).

Litwhiler, a 1939 graduate of Bloomsburg, Pa. State College, spent 12 years as a player in the majors before ending his career in 1951. During that time he played with the Philadelphia Phillies, St. Louis Cardinals, the old Boston Braves and the Cincinnati Reds. Danny was with the Cardinals in the 1943 and 1944 World Series and played in the 1942 All-Star game.

Among his memorable achievements is his string of 21 straight games in which he hit safely in his first season in the majors. In 1941 he belted at least one home run in every National League park.

Litwhiler was a perfectionist in the field. He became the first major leaguer to play an entire season without making an error, handling 317 chances in 151 games in 1942. Over a period of two seasons he set a record of playing 187 consecutive errorless games, a feat which put Litwhiler's glove in baseball's Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y.

His best full season at bat came in 1941 when he hit .305. He compiled a lifetime batting average of .282.

Danny managed in professional ball for three years. He was player-manager of Fargo, N.D. in 1952, at Wilkes-Barre, Pa. in 1953, and at Jamestown, N.Y. and Duluth, Minn. in 1954. From there he joined the Florida State staff.

Litwhiler is widely-known for several coaching innovations such as an unbreakable mirror for pitchers to check their deliveries, and employment of a bat sawed in half to teach bunting. More recently, Litwhiler came up with the idea of using a radar gun to chart the velocity of pitches. The clever use of this device has brought enthusiastic responses from major league teams and scouts.

Danny also has developed "Diamond Grit" to condition wet fields and "Diamond Dust" to dry wet baseballs. He constantly seeks to improve the attractiveness of baseball games and has had bat girls working at home MSU contests for a number of years.

Litwhiler has contributed to several baseball publications. They include "Fundamentals of Baseball" by University Press, 1956; "Baseball Glossary" in English, Dutch, Italian and Spanish, by University Press, 1958; "Baseball Coaches Guide to Drills and Skills," by Prentice-Hall, 1963; "Baseball," by Prentice-Hall, 1967, and "A Treasury of Baseball Drills -- Featuring Favorites of Top Coaches," by Parker Publishing Co., 1979.

Litwhiler is popular on the lecture tour and has conducted countless clinics for coaches and youngsters world-wide. He currently is the international president of the U.S. Baseball Federation.

Danny was born August 31, 1916, in Ringtown, Pa. He is married to Patricia Walsh James and the couple has ten children and 15 grandchildren. Mrs. Litwhiler and children Marcia, Dick and Nancy all received their bachelor's and master's degrees from Michigan State. Dick was a pitcher on the Spartan varsity 13 years ago and he now teaches physical education at Georgia Southwestern. Youngest son Mark is a junior at Aquinas College and has lettered in soccer. Son Danny teaches math and is assistant baseball coach at the Air Force Academy.

FRANK PELLERIN Assistant Coach

Continuing a longtime association with Michigan State baseball is Frank E. Pellerin, member of Spartan teams as an undergraduate, and a staff member for the 28th season.

He was appointed as assistant coach in 1953, working with the late John H. Kobs, and the same assignment was extended in 1963 with present head man Danny Litwhiler.

During Pellerin's tenure, Spartan baseballers have played more than 1000 games (1056 games, 633 wins, 411 losses and 12 ties), won three Big Ten team titles (1954, 1978 and 1979) and placed second five times. He's helped coach the Spartans in 27 of their 29 Big Ten seasons and has had a hand in the development of 39 athletes who've earned All-Big Ten first-team selection.

Pellerin played under Kobs at State, earning varsity letters in 1941, 1942 and 1943 with stints at second base and at third base. He enrolled at State after graduation from Redford High School in Detroit where he won letters in football, basketball and baseball.

His first teaching and coaching position was at Highland Park, Mich. High School where he remained until joining the Michigan State staff in September, 1953.

While at Highland Park, Pellerin was head baseball coach, assisted in swimming, football, basketball and physical education classes, and also taught classes in mathematics.

Pellerin received the master's degree in counseling and guidance in 1951 at Wayne State University. He and wife, Nancy, have two sons, Michael and Tim. He was born 9-30-21 in Highland Park.

TOM SMITH Freshman Coach

In his 13th season as junior varsity baseball coach at Michigan State is Thomas W. Smith, who was appointed to the post in September of 1967.

He had served unofficially in the capacity the previous four years while working towards his B.S. degree. In the years that he's handled the Spartan young players, the MSU varsity has recorded an impressive 330-211-6 won-lost-tied mark.

Smith enrolled at State as an undergraduate after playing in professional baseball from 1961 to 1963 with the Milwaukee Braves organization. He was a catcher. He went with the Braves following high school graduation.

Tom is a native of Coldwater, Mich., born Dec. 9, 1942. He graduated from Coldwater High School in 1961 and immediately signed his professional contract. He received his B.S. degree in physical education in March, 1967 and his master's degree in March of 1971.

In addition to his coaching duties, Smith teaches physical education. He and wife, Jane Marie, have two daughters, Jamie and Julie.
